- Taught at Elementaries in Pleasant Grove and Jr. High in American Fork
- Served two terms as City Recorder in Pleasant Grove Utah
- Served on the Pleasant Grove Library Board

- Served as Mayor of American Fork City
- Moved to Lehi
- Was Principal of Lehi High School
- Charter Member of the Lions Club
- Member of the Timpanogos Knife and Fork Club
- Served in the Young Men's presidency
- Taught Gospel Doctrine for over 35 Years.
- Married to Opal Wadley in the Salt Lake Temple on August 23, 1916.
- Father of 5 children.

- Married Blaine Adamson in December 1953
- Mother of 6 children
- Hairdresser and Beauty Salon owner

Allen, Ann

- Charter Member of the Letitian Club 1952

Allen, Frank

- Called by Brigham Young to help the ill fated Handcart companies
November 1856.

Allen, Rusty

- National Finals Rodeo Cowboy from Lehi.

Allison, Edward Martin

- Member of the Second company of Lehi Militia who were called to Echo Canyon during the Utah War.

Allison, Edward Martin Jr.

- Prominent Attorney in the State of Utah.

Allred, Aaron

- Aaron Allred, son of James W. and Kate Jones Allred, was born October 3, 1888, in Lehi, Utah.
- He received his early education in Lehi, and later attended the Utah State Agricultural College in Logan and Brigham Young University at Provo.
- He married Elva Fullmer of Raymond, Canada December 8, 1912, in the Salt Lake Temple.
- They were blessed with 3 sons: A. Fullmer, Mark E. and Sterling W.

- His wife died in 1919.
- On June 1, 1922, he married Myrtle Jones of Provo in the Salt Lake Temple. They had one daughter Maurine.

Allred, Ada Gilchrist

- Ada Gilchrist Allred was born in Lehi, Utah, November 25, 1891, the daughter of Robert T. and Mary Jane Willes Gilchrist.
- Ada was a lover of music and dramatics in both of which she took an active part most of her life.
- She married Herman Elisha Allred November 20, 1912. From this union, six children were born, one girl and five boys.
- When their first child was seven months old, they built a home on a ranch west of the Jordan River where they lived until 1937.
- Their family then moved back to Lehi and to the Fourth Ward where Ada was born.
- She was then put in as Relief Society Visiting Teacher, a position she held for many years.. She also served on the refreshment committee of the ward Relief Society for eight years.
- She died in Lehi on December 9, 1969.

- Lehi Ninth Ward Bishop 1988-

Allred, Cathy

- Lehi Free Press and Daily Herald Journalist for over 20 years.

Allred, Harriet Hartley

- Harriet Hartley, wife of John G. Allred, was born in England.
- She emigrated to Utah with her two sisters , Mrs. Isaac Fox of Lehi and Mrs. Harry Pitchforth of Nephi.
- She possessed rare musical talents and was teacher of the organ and piano in all the wards to which she lived, including the Minneapolis branch of the North Central States mission.
- She was one of the earliest organists in Lehi.
- She died October 20, 1934.

Allred, Herman Elisha

- Herman Elisha Allred, the sixth child of Dilbert H. and Orinda Davis Allred,

was born May 4, 1889, in Lehi, Utah.

- His early childhood was spent on a ranch four miles west of Lehi on the Jordan River, where his parents homesteaded this land.
- He married Ada Gilchrist, November 12, 1920.
- Two years later, he and his wife built a home and raised their six children on the same ranch which he was raised.
- Their children are: Velma LaVerl, Herman Don, Wayne H., Ralph H., D. Rudean, and Roger G.
- Through the illness of Herman, with tularemia or rabbit fever, as it is commonly called, they lost their home and farm, so moved back to Lehi in 1937.
- They moved into and started buying the home of his wife's folks who had recently passed away.
- Herman was a great scoutmaster in the Fourth Ward from 1937-1947
- Died in July 1974.

Allred, James Henry

- James Henry Allred, eldest son of Paulinas H. Allred and Melissa Norton, was born January 10, 1849 in Salt Lake City.
- James Allred married Kate Jones, June 16, 1873, in the Salt Lake Endowment House.
- Ten children came to their home: J. Urban, John Gurnett, James (deceased), Minerva (Wade), Clarence, Rodney, Buell, Aaron, Hugh (deceased), Odessa (Cullimore).
- Lehi City Councilor 1898-99
- When Salt Lake City sank artesian wells in the Jordan River, this tapping the source of water supply, James Allred, with his sons went to Raymond, Canada, where they took up land and engaged in farming.
- From 1893-95 he served as a missionary to the Southern States. At home he served in the Sunday School Superintendency.
- In their declining years, they made their home in Salt Lake City where they spent several years doing Temple work.

Allred, John Gurnett

- John Gurnett Allred, son of James B. and Kate Jones Allred, was born in

Lehi, Utah September 11, 1876

- He married Harriet Hartley in the Salt Lake Temple, February 14, 1900.
- He had two sons, Paul and Harold, the former having preceded him in death, the latter living with his family in Salt Lake City, Utah.
- In 1925-29, he served as president of the newly formed North Central States Mission with headquarters in Minneapolis where his wife presided over the Relief Society of that mission.
- He became a pioneer in settling Raymond, Canada, in 1903 where he was a successful farmer and stock raiser for eighteen years of which he was Bishop of the Raymond First Ward.
- He was known for his short, terse, effective sermons. John G. Allred was fluent in speech with a logical mind, quick and decisive in judgment, which made him an able defender of truth.
- He moved back to Lehi, his native city, in the later part of his life, where he owned a home and a farm which he operated.
- After a lingering illness, he died in the Latter-day Saints hospital, March 8, 1937.

Allred, Kate Markland Jones

- Kate Markland Jones Allred was born July 17, 1854, in Salt Lake City.
- When she was a child, she went to live with her grandmother Katherine Nesbit Mulliner. She and her grandmother were among the company that left when the United States soldiers, entered the city.
- She attended school in Lehi.
- She was blessed with ten children and took several children to raise for various periods of their lives.
- At this time, skilled medical help was extremely limited. Hospitals were not available to the average person. The Church, being aware of the tremendous need for better care in childbirth, sent people out to the communities to give courses in obstetrics to women particularly adapted to nursing. Kate Allred responded to this call. She completed the course and was set apart for this special mission, to which she lovingly devoted many years of her life.
- After she was given her certificate as midwife, she was set apart for this special mission by the Stake Presidency. Then following a period of years of

service in hundreds of homes in Lehi where she served untiringly together with two or three other women.

- Kate Allred enjoyed many years of service in the Church, as teacher in the many organizations, as President of Primary and Relief Society, and as a member of the Relief Society Stake Board.
- She died on March 21, 1935

Allred, Paulinas H.

- Completed the Lehi Councilor term of William Clark 1861-62

Allred, Quinn

- Lehi Viet Nam Veteran
- Commander Lehi American Legion

Allred, Robert

Allred, Robert M.

- Lehi City Fire Chief 1922-23

Allred, Rodney C.

- First Lehi Stake Presidency 2nd Counselor 1928-1947

Allred, Sherwin

- Lehi Dry Farmer and Cattle Rancher
- Member of the Lehi City Council 1988-91
- Lehi Sixth Ward Bishop 1970-1975
- Donated the Land for the Sherwin Allred Park
- Veteran of World War II
- Leader in the American Legion for many years
- Owned Cold Springs area.

Allred, Tuff

- Tuff bought the Steele Building at 60 West Main and opened a barber shop in 1951.
- He cut hair until he became ill.
- Opened Backroom Antiques behind his barbershop in 1972.

Adamson, Lloyd B.

- Lehi High School Principal 1939-1954

Anderson, Andrew Bjrring

- Graduated from the Brigham Young Academy in 1886 under the director of Karl Maeser.
- Charter Member of the Lehi Silver Band in 1887.
- Clerk for the Peoples Co-op for many years.
- Teacher and Principal of Beaver, Uintah and Lehi Schools
- Principal of the Murdock Academy, a division of the Brigham Young Academy.
- District Principal of Lehi Schools 1908-1919
- Alpine School Board Member 1933-1941
- Attended the National Democratic Convention in Chicago supporting Grover Cleveland

Anderson, Andrew Rasmus

- Settled in Ephraim in 1862.
- Fought in the Black Hawk War(while in Ephraim)
- Part of the Lehi Militia called to defend Fort Limhi against the Indians March 8, 1858
- Moved to Lehi in August 1867
- Loved Farming and raised horses and had a dairy farm.
- Purchased Canute Petersons and farm and returned to Lehi
- Became a Lehi Policeman in 1871 and later that year was appointed Marshal by Mayor Winn. Only lasted five months until he resigned.
- Served as Lehi's 8th Mayor 1879-1880
- Served in the Lehi Ward Bishopric for over twenty-seven years until the ward was divided in 1904.
- Board of Directors of the Lehi Irrigation Company
- Director of the Lehi Bank
- Director Utah Banking Corporation
- Director People's Cooperative
- Member of the Lehi Dramatic Association in 1854.
- Lehi City Marshal 1871
- Promoter of the Lehi Tabernacle

- Spent three months in prison for polygamy.
- Spent five years in Manassa, Colorado away from the anti-polygamy crusade.
- Said the Prayer at the Cornerstone dedication on September 14, 1901
- Funeral was in the Lehi Tabernacle and was one of the largest in Lehi History.

Anderson, Blaine P.

- Lehi Tenth Ward Bishop 1974-1981

Anderson, Donna

- Lehi Historian of the LDS Church in Lehi and the Lehi Roundup Rodeo.
- Rodeo Queen contest Chairman and committee member for many years.
- School Teacher
- Donator of Lehi Roundup Rodeo Items to the Lehi City Historical Archives.

Anderson, Eva Davis

- Owned a Beauty Business in Lehi in 1937.

Anderson, Evans L.

- Bishop Lehi First Ward 1938-1946

Anderson, Hyrum A.

- Bishop Lehi First Ward 1928-1938
- Lehi City Council Member 1940-43

Anderson, James M.

- Lehi City Councilor 1891-93
- First Lehi City Superintendent of School

Anderson, Johanah Johnson Jacobs

- Moved to Lehi in 1852 with her husband Mons.
- Midwife for many years.
- Nursed the sick and comforted the weary.

Anderson, Joseph J.

- Lehi City Postmaster
- Taught evening High school classes at the Ross School during the fall of 1896.

Anderson, Lucille

- One of the first Lehi Organists-Lehi Tabernacle Choir Organist.

Anderson, Lulu Dorton

- The original Lehi Tabernacle Choir organist when it was organized in 1905.

Anderson, Mary, Anne Pederson

- Treasurer of the first Relief Society Presidency 1882-1900
- Served as a counselor of the Lehi Ward Relief Society 1900-1903
- Served as President of the Lehi Ward Relief Society 1903-1907.

Anderson, Melvin

- President Lehi Sons of the Utah Pioneers
- Built the current (2013) Lehi Silver Bandwagon
- Built numerous other carts and wagons used in the Lehi parades and events.
- Member of the Lehi 6th Ward Bishopric
- Lehi Historian
- Instrumental in bringing the Austin Pioneer Cabin to the Hutchings Museum.
- Director Lehi Civic Improvement Association 1986-2008

Anderson, Mons

- Converted to Mormonism on his way to the Goldfields in California
- He was the first man in Lehi to produce flax, hemp and broom corn and to manufacture from these produced rough linen, rope and brooms.
- President of the Scandinavian Association in Lehi

Anderson, Ralph

- Director Lehi Civic Improvement Association 1972-2008

Anderson, Scott

- Director Lehi Civic Improvement Association 2000-2008

Andreason, John

- Built a home on the west side of the Old Lehi Fort in 1854.

Armistead, Arreva D.

- One of the organists in Lehi for the Lehi Tabernacle Choir.

Ash, Cecil L.

- Principal Lehi Elementary
- Lehi Second Ward Bishop 1946-1950
- Lehi Utah Stake Patriarch

Asher, Clara

- 1926-27 Lehi City Recorder

Asher, William

- Lehi City Attorney 1912-13; 1922-24; 1934-35

Asher, Wallace William

- Born in Lehi in 1900
- Enlisted in World War I on May 3, 1917
- Died of pneumonia at Douglas, Arizona, November 22, 1918

Ashton, Connie

- Began Working for Lehi City in 1992
- Lehi City Recorder 1994-2010

Ashton, Dale

- Lehi City Council Member 1984-89

Ashton, Earl M.

- Born in Lehi in 1892
- Enlisted in the Army June 26, 1918.
- Died at Camp Lewis of influenza and pneumonia October 24, 1918.

Ashton, Joseph

- Veteran of the Black Hawk War 1865-67
- Member of the first Lehi Brass Band in 1871.

Ashton, Thomas

- Family settled in Lehi in 1851
- Built a home on the North side of the Old Lehi Fort in 1854
- Chairman of the Carpentry for the Lehi Meeting House 1855-60 with Lorenzo Hatch and Hiland D. Wilcox.
- Lehi City Councilor 1854-55; 1859-66; 1877-79
- Member of the Second company of Lehi Militia who were called to Echo Canyon during the Utah War.
- City Hall Building Committee 1877
- Major Builder of the Maid of Iowa in Nauvoo
- Worked on building the first water ditches in Lehi
- Active in the planning and building the first Bridge Across the Jordan River.

Austin, Cliff

- Attended the original Sego Lily School

- Head of the WPA in Lehi during the depression. Held position for 10 years.

Austin, George

- Lehi City Councilor 1896-1900
- Lehi's 16th Mayor 1901-1902
- Elected to the State Legislature 1902-and resigned Mayor
- Helps create the Commercial Club to promote business and agricultural growth in Lehi. Become the First President. Early 1905.
- Plant the first Sugar Beets on land owned by George Comer in Spring of 1891.
- Given the assignment to convince farmers to change to producing Sugar beets for the factory.
- Agricultural superintendent of the entire Utah-Idaho Sugar Company from 1891-1917
- Purchased Saratoga Resort with his brother from 1914-1930 including failed new community and chicken industry at Saratoga.
- Founded the Lehi Slaughtering Company.
- Founded Austin Brothers Companies with his brothers.
- Vice President of the National Woolgrowers' Association
- Founded Salt Lake Union stock yards.
- As Mayor, purchased the land for the Pavilion and City Park (Rodeo Grounds)
- Began the First Volunteer Fire Department in 1901.

Austin, John

- Born in England on December 3, 1822
- Joined the LDS church.
- Desired to join the Mormons in America. Didn't have the money.
- Builder of the Cabin at Hutchings Museum at Bull River
- Came to Lehi And settled in the North Bench up by the Alpine Highway area in the Buller River Ditch.
- He is among the first to grow Sugar Beets in the Lehi Area.
- Died February 13, 1907

Austin, Parley

- Raised his family in the Cabin at the Hutchings Museum at Bull River

- Lehi City Council Member 1906-1909; 1912-13
- As City councilmember purchased the Beck property for the Lehi Park and Pavilion in 1900. He negotiated a price of \$1500.

Austin, Thomas

- One of the owners of the Austin Brothers Companies
- Built a beautiful home in 1901 at 427 East 500 North.
- One of the owners of the Lehi Slaughtering Company and the Slaughtering Meat Market.

Austin, William Sr.

- Surveyed and Dug the Bull River Ditch from Alpine across the Bench to the Jordan River in 1875.

Bain, Robert Angus

- Lehi Pioneer who helped bring the Willie Handcart Company
- Brought many of the Company to Lehi.

Bair, Clyde J.

- Born August 30, 1924 in Alpine, Utah
- He was a track star in High School and won many awards.
- He married Lehi Girl Doris Gordon on 22 November 1946
- Began his career in Hotel Management in Colorado
- Worked in Administration at Brigham Young University
- Served as a Bishop in Colorado
- Served as a Bishop at Brigham Young University
- Lehi Utah Stake Presidency 1977-1987
- Housing Official at Brigham Young University
- Loved to Fish and Hunt.
- He built beautiful pieces of furniture and gun stocks out of wood.
- Professionally genealogist having prepared thousands of names for temple work.
- Died February 21, 2014

Bair, Doris Gordon

- Married Clyde Bair in the Salt Lake Temple in 1946.
- Mother of Two Daughters.

Baird, James R.

- Lehi West Stake Presidency 1990-

Baird, Scott

- During World War II he was on the battleship Missouri when the Japanese surrendered. It was on August 31, 1945. The Battleship Missouri was named after the home state of President Harry Truman. It weighed 45000 tons and was one of the most powerful battleships of World War II. This was its last mission.

Baker, Glen

- In March 1948, Glen Baker purchased Bank's Appliance Business at 189 West Main.

Ball, Carrie

- Ran a Home school from her home at first east and first north.
- Described as a "dear soul" who would get the boys and girls around her kitchen stove and try to teach the ABC's while she was cooking. (Elisha Peck Jr.)

Ball, Martha

- Lehi City Treasurer 1922-33

Ball, Travis

- Lehi Power Director -2013.

Ball, William

- Family came across the plains in the Israel Evans Handcart Company 1857
- Arrived in Lehi in September 1857
- Farmer
- First Permanent Jordan River Bridge Toll Collector 1858

Banasky, Marilyn

- Current Lehi City Recorder. 2010-Current

Banks, Edna

- Wife of Junius C. Banks.
- Home Decoration for the Lehi Ladies Farm Bureau in 1923.
- Buried in Pleasant Grove.

Banks, Junius Crossland

- From Pleasant Grove
- Graduated at the University of Utah

- Principal at Mercur schools
- In 1905, taught at Mapleton
- In 1906, he came to Lehi to teach 8th grade
- In 1907, he was let out of his contract and went to work for Silver Brothers as a draughtsman.(draftsman). Came back after a short time and starts teaching at the High School.
- He stars in an Operetta that they put on for the students for Chirstmas 1907 of Snow White. He played the prince.
- In January 1908, he sang a duet with Helen Greenwood as a program to raise money for departing missionaries.
- In 1914, he worked with the Boys Clubs of Lehi and he worked with them to help clean the city.
- He was President of the Alpine Stake YMMIA and met with the City council to get the Pavilion as a gymnasium for Young Men activities. in 1914. He would go around giving talks to the Young Men.
- Gave awards to young men of the Summer Boys club and took winners and participants to the Pavilion Fall 1914.
- Principal of Lehi High School in 1920
- At the Lehi First Ward Festival, he debate May Lott on which are the more intelligent men or women 9-08-1922.
- Had 400 lbs of Coal stolen from his yard at 4-20-1922
- Chairman of the 4th of July Celebration in Lehi in 1922.
- Edited the Lehi Sun for a few months in 1922 while the editors were out of town
- Delegate in 1922 to the Democratic County Convention.
- Charge of the Utah County Clean Town, Clean Homes campaign.
- Lehi City Judge 1940-43
- Large writer of the 1950 Centennial History
- He died in 1963 and was buried in Pleasant Grove, his hometown.

Banks, Ruth

- Writer in the Lehi Centennial History
- Manager and Editor of the Lehi Sun Newspaper 1947-48.

Banks, Wallace

- Opened Banks Appliances was opened in 1944 at 189 West Main.
- It remained there until 1948.

Barber, George

- Part of the Lehi Militia called to defend Fort Limhi against the Indians
March 8, 1858

Barber, Lester L.

- Lehi Sixteenth Ward Bishop 1986-1989

Barnes, Amy Hadfield

- John Hutchings Museum Board of Directors for many years.
- Spent many hours as a volunteer at the John Hutchings Museum.

Barnes, Charles

- Charles Barnes had a home early on on the site of the Legacy Center, "across the fence" from Porter Rockwell.
- Lehi City Councilor 1877-79
- Lehi City Treasurer 1869-1871.

Barnes, Charles Jr.

- Charles Barnes Jr. was the first cooper of Lehi and helped build the fort.

Barnes, Donna Fowler

- Owner/operator of Scrooge and Marley Gift Shop. Closed down in 2013.
- Alpine School District School Board Member 2003-2010

Barnes, Freeman

- Lehi Veteran of World War II

Barnes, Harold W.

- Lehi Third Ward Bishop 1949-1956
- Lehi City Council Member 1944-45

Barnes, Jack

- In 1953 Opened a Television Sales and Repair Shop on Main Street.

Barnes, Johnny L.

- Lehi West Stake Presidency 1983-1990
- Lehi City Council member 1982-83; 1990-93
- Lehi Booster Club Officer
- Chairman Lehi District Boy Scouts of America
- Chairman Lehi Family Committee

- Lehi High School Student body President 1970

Barnes, Marley

- Owner of Scrooge and Marley Closed down in 2013
- Popular Lehi Elementary Teacher for many years.

Barnes, Silas Parker

- Came to Lehi in 1852
- Built first home outside of the fort. Order to join the fort.
- Built a home on the south side of the Old Lehi Fort in 1854.
- 1st Mayor of Lehi 1853-54
- Left Lehi for California in April 1854

Barr, Jessie Butt

- Assistant Organists for the Lehi Tabernacle Choir when it was formed in 1905.

Bateman, Bernel LaVar

- World War II Veteran from Lehi

Bateman, Lexia

- Founding member of the Lehi Auctus Club in 1939

Bateman, Lornell

- Member of the Olympian Club-Served as Vice President in 1950.

Baum, Larry

- Founded the Broadcaster Restaurant at 102 West Main in February 1978.

Baum, Sue Ellen

- Founded the Broadcaster Restaurant at 102 West Main in February 1978.

Bearce, Scott

- Lehi High School Principal 2005-2010

Beck, Johann George

- Georg was born in 1848 at Wurttemberg, Germany.
- On the way to Lehi we were caught in a heavy storm of snow. The snow was up to our knees, which was very unpleasant. We arrived in Lehi October 28, 1864.
- When he arrived in Lehi he started to work for Israel Evans, chopping wood and hauling manure. He got nine dollars for his work for which he bought him a new hat.

- He went to work for John C. Naegle in Washington County.
- On the first of June, 1866, he was called to serve in the Black Hawk War
- Brought the first mower and reaper to Lehi. Andrew A. Peterson was farming for John C. Nagle and ran the first mower and Georg Beck ran the first horse rake in Lehi. When the grain was ripe the mower was changed to a reaper and they had to go behind and bind the bundles. That was in 1869.
- Located the Tintic Mine, Shipped ore to Cottonwood to a smelter. He gave Lehi farmers a chance to haul ore to the smelter in their spare time. It gave the Lehi farmers extra money.
- Married September 27, 1869 in the Old Endowment House to Annie (Anna) Johnson,
- Member of the first Lehi Brass Band in 1871.
- One of the original settlers of Lehi Junction.
- He helped to make the first water ditches and helped to open streets,
- He served as first assistant in Sunday School for twelve years.
- Lehi City Council member 1904-05
- He was a precinct justice for fourteen years.
- Committee for the North Branch Meeting House in 1893
- After the repeal of Prohibition, he opened with his brother John a cider press and a wine press in the fortress time building.
- Hundreds of Apple trees were planted on the property from center and first east to State and sixth north. Everything was apples except for the property the Central School was on.
- The Beck vineyards covered twenty acres from the Union Pacific Railroad tracks to the Cemetery.
- People would sing this song, "'Oh mister Georgie Beck, how could you be so mean. To grind up all those worms in your apple machine"
- Local Lehi Prohibition put John and George out of business.
- He died June 6, 1933

Beck, John

- Born on March 19, 1843 in Germany.
- He joined the LDS Church in Switzerland in 1861.
- Served a mission to Germany and converted most of his family.

- Came to America and Lehi in 1864.
- In 1865 he moved to Richfield to farm. Returned to Lehi one year later.
- Financed the Creation of the First Lehi Brass Band and half of the instruments-He was a member of that band.
- Purchased the First Lehi Park for the Citizens of Lehi (Lehi Rodeo Grounds) in July 1900.
- Leased the Saratoga site from John Naegle and raised sheep and manufactured charcoal. Did well financially..
- Built the John Beck home at 791 north and 100 East in 1867. It was toe down in 2013.
- In 1870, Beck purchased an interest in the Tintic mine ; but lost most of his investment.
- The “Crazy Dutchman” as he was gold found gold in the Tintic and Eureka areas which made millions.
- Most of the time he made big and lost big through his investments.
- Built a rock barn on his property which was initially used by Wells Fargo for their stage properties.
- After the repeal of Prohibition, he and his brother George opened a cider press and a wine press in the fortress time building.
- Hundreds of Apple trees were planted on the property from center and first east to State and sixth north. Everything was apples except for the property the Central School was on.
- Their vineyards covered twenty acres from the Union Pacific Railroad tracks to the Cemetery.
- He paid off the amount owed on the Relief Society Hall so that it could be finished and dedicated in October 1883.
- Local Lehi Prohibition put George and John out of business.
- Opened and operated Beck’s Hot Springs (Saratoga) in July 24, 1884.
- In 1890, he moved to Salt Lake with his five wives.
- Died on 02 April 1913 from a nail cut in his foot that he got blood poisoning.
- Had part of his foot amputated and died from shock.

- General watermaster for Lehi for several years.
- Director of the People's Co-op
- Director Lehi's United Order of Enoch 1874-1880

Bone, William Jr.

- Veteran of the Black Hawk War 1865-67
- Lehi City Councilor 1900-1909
- Served as President for several term for the Lehi Irrigation Company. Also on the Board for Many years.
- Went back east and brought back part of the Salt Lake Tabernacle Organ.

Bradder, Arthur

- He was born on 1 of August, 1855 in Nottingham, England.
- He married Mary Jane Chappel on the 21 November, 1874 in Cardiff, Wales.
- The immigration from Cardiff and Canton in Glamorgan, Wales, included the stonemason Arthur Bradder and his young family which included wife Mary Jane Chappelle, granddaughter of Johanna The family traveled from Liverpool England aboard the ship Wisconsin, departing 19 Sep 1877 and arriving New York City on the 22nd.
- He and his wife lost nine children in childhood, which caused a great burden on their life.
- It was a struggle for him to come up with money to get the stone to get into

business.

- The cornerstone of the Lehi Tabernacle, was paid for by the nickels of the Sunday School children. It was cut and furnished by Arthur Bradder, a local stone cutter. It cost \$600.
- Worked cutting granite for the Salt Lake Temple
- Did the Stonework for the Ogden City Hall
- Moved to Lehi in 1897
- Formed a partnership and established the Lehi Marble Works on the northeast corner of 400 north and 100 East.
- The downtown People's Cooperative(Colonial House) shows his work today.
- Did numerous business stone work from 1902-08 including Peoples Co-op, Log Cabin Saloon, Merrihew Building, and the Racker Block.
- Did all the stonework for the Lehi Tabernacle in 1930 including the Cornerstone that is in the Lehi Archives and the Holiness to the Lord that is in some area of the City Crews..
- Did the stonework on the Pioneer Monument on 21 April 1908..
- Did granite and marble cemetery monuments at the Lehi cemetery.
- Did the granite work for the Alpine Tabernacle.
- He worked cutting stone until his death in 1930.
- His tombstone is the largest in the Lehi Cemetery.
- He died in Lehi on December 15, 1930.

Bradshaw, Emma Briggs

- Married John Franklin Bradshaw on January 3, 1889
- Mother of four sons and three daughters.
- John Bradshaw gave credit for his success in business to his wife Emma.
- She served as a counselor in the Lehi Second Ward Relief Society.
- She died on April 27, 1923.

Bradshaw, Franklin

- Grew up in Lehi in the home at 3 East State.
- Son of John Franklin Bradshaw
- Founder of Bradshaw Auto Parts.
- Murdered by his grandson in 1978 in Salt Lake.

Bradshaw, Jenna

- One of the Lehi Tabernacle Choir Organists.

Bradshaw, John Franklin

- Born in Lehi July 15. 1869
- Lived with his grandfather William Bone growing up.
- In 1888 secured a homestead in Rexburg, Idaho. Returned to Lehi in 1891 after his home and all of his possessions burnt down.
- Worked on the Construction of the Lehi Sugar Factory.
- Harvested the first acre of onions in Lehi which were very profitable.
- Also raised Sugar Beets for the Lehi Sugar Factory.
- Represented the Livestock Commission in 1893 and 1894 buying sheep and cattle and loaning money (millions of dollars) to Utah ranchers.
- In 1904, the Bradshaws moved to Canada and homesteaded Bradshaw, Canada a town and railroad stop. He produced great amounts of grain.
- He returned to Lehi in 1914 and built his fourth house he had in Lehi. It is located at 3 East State.
- He had murals painted on the inside of the home about events of the Bradshaw family.
- He was chairman of the Lehi Second Ward Old Folks Committee.
- Purchased Lehi Drug Store from E. B. Merrihew with Gerald Taylor in September 1917. Changed the name to Lehi Drug Company.
- Exchanged the Merrihew Building for the old Garff Hall and Opera House in 1919.
- Sold the Lehi Drug Store to the Taylor Brothers in 1927
- Had the first vehicle in Lehi after the invention of the car by John Devey.
- Had a Black Cadillac with double reduction rear end and 6 forward gears with 2 reverse gears.
- He served as a director of the State Bank of Lehi from 1917-1941
- He was a director of the Lehi Red Cross during World War I.
- He organized and was President of the American Savings and Loan Company headquartered in Salt Lake. A son ran it for him.
- He was President of Western Chemical Company.
- He created the Lehi Cereal Mill

- He was part owner of the Lehi Slaughtering House and the Slaughtering Meat Market at 101 West Main.
- President and owner of the Magrath Trading Company.
- He built the corner grocery at 110 West Main and Bakery Building at 107 West Main.
- He died in Lehi on September 4, 1941.

Bradshaw, Mary Ann Bone

- Married Richard Travis Bradshaw on July 26, 1867.
- Mother of three children
- Died January 1872.

Bradshaw, Richard

- Lehi City Councilor 1896-97. 1900
- He was part owner of the Lehi Slaughtering House and the Slaughtering Meat Market at 101 West Main in 1893-1894.
- Moved from Lehi in 1900.

Bradshaw, Richard Travis.

- Born in England on September 26, 1845
- Came to Utah in 1854
- Built their first home where the old Lehi High School was.
- Ran a Produce Delivery Business. He delivered food to Mercur and the Mines.
- He had a contract to deliver food to the soldiers at Camp Floyd.
- He played the concertina for young folks dances.
- He established the first independent privately owned mercantile institution in Lehi.
- Owned the Grocery Business west of the bakery on Main Street.
- Died June 26, 1872.

Bradshaw, Sylvia Bushman

- Married John Franklin Bradshaw after the death of his wife in February, 1924.
- She had one daughter.

Brems, Ferrel Eric

- Born in 1908 in Lehi

- Salesman throughout the West
- Started with the Lehi ZCMI Branch Store
- Best All around Athlete Award for 1927 and 1928 at Lehi High School.

Broadbent, Alice Davis

- Born October 23, 1918 in Provo
- As a Beehive she won the Honeycomb Contest of the State and was awarded a religious book.
- Graduated from Provo High School
- Received a year's training at Business and Mechanical Drafting at the Woodbury's College in Los Angeles, California.

- In the summer of 1937 she came to work in Lehi for her sister Eva Anderson who was in the Beauty business.
- Married John Shaw Broadbent May 16, 1938 in the Salt Lake Temple.
- Mother of three children.
- Owned Broadbents Store with her husband John
- Decorated and dressed porcelain dolls for the store. Keepsakes for many a young girl or women.
- Worked in the Young Women for many years.
- Painted Signs for the Lehi Rodeo Committee
- Painted many oil paintings in people's front rooms.
- Taught Art Classes in Lehi for many years.
- Lehi Hospital Board. Would can peaches for feeding the patients.
- Started the Broadbent Store Nativity in 1944 during World War II and Broadbents has had it ever since.
- Known for her sewing and dressing of dolls. She would buy porcelain dolls and then dress them in clothes she designed and sewn. They were bought by people all over the United States.
- She became an expert in makeup and would have clients from all over come and help them with it.
- She died in Lehi on the 20 January, 2010

Broadbent, Amanda Twede

- Born March 10, 1863 in Salt Lake City, Utah
- She became the housekeeper, cook, and seamstress for a rich Jewish family in Salt Lake.
- In 1880, Amanda was persuaded to come take care of the Joseph Broadbent family and their dying mother. She moved to Lehi with the Broadbent family and took care of them.

- The Broadbent son, Joseph Samuel took Amanda Broadbent as his wife and were married in the Logan Temple on January 16, 1889.
- She was the mother of eight children and died while they were still young.
- She died April 27, 1905.

Broadbent, Annie Shaw

- Opens the Broadbents Store in 1883 with his son.. It was called the Music

Emporium.

- Repaired clocks and jewelry
- First Lehi Old Folks Committee 1892
- Served in the Lehi Choirs and Bands
- Bugler in the Utah Militia
- Died in 1920
- Broadbent's store was turned over to his son Joseph Samuel

Broadbent, Joseph Samuel

- Born November 3, 1863 in Lehi

- Lehi's 24th Mayor 1922-1928
- Opened the Broadbent and Son Store with his father in 1883.

- Purchased the Winn Floral shop and greenhouse supplies on Christmas Day 1910.
- Continued the store after his father's death with his sons Alvin and John.
- One of the major forces behind the Memorial Building. The Building was dedicated while he was Mayor.
- Started the first municipal Power Department
- Built the first municipal diesel powered plant in the State of Utah.
- On June 7, 1914, was selected general chairman of the Lehi Old Folks Committee. For eleven years, he was the love of all the committee members, being released February 22, 1925.
- Served as Lehi Stake Sunday School Superintendent for four years.
- Passionate about Music. Sang with the Lehi Ward choir.
- He served several male glee clubs.
- Broadbent sang with Isaac Fox choral group which won first prize in an 1894 county-wide concert.
- He died February 4, 1937
- His son John Shaw Broadbent took over the store

Broadbent, Sarah Dixon

- Walked every step across the plains and from Salt Lake to Lehi.
- Came to Lehi in 1859
- Their first house consisted of a “dugout”, that is a room that was partly in the ground with low walls on top of the excavation and a reef.
- Their furniture was of the most primitive type, stumps of trees served for table and chairs and poles for a bed, and with very little bedding. Having no lamp or candles they used a greasy rag in a dish for a light.
- Sewed Homemade work clothing that was sold at the Broadbents Store. Specialized in Overalls and Jumpers.
- Major force in the success of the Broadbent Store.
- She died early in her life.

Broadbent, Sylvester

Broomhead, Alfred J.

- Born in 1872 in Salt Lake City
- He moved his mother and sister to Lehi in 1889.

- Member of the Daughters of the Utah Pioneers
- Married Alfred J. Broomhead in 1932.
- She had no children.
- Was a gifted artist and specialized in China, Oil and water painting.
- She died in 1956.

- His mother was gravely ill when he was born and they both about died. It took many months for Wane to start being healthy. His mother never really recovered.
- Wane had head months from the tools that was very painful and wounds that took constant care. His sisters took care of him and nurtured him.

- One day he ran away from school.
- He grew up in Richfield, Utah
- He served an LDS mission to the Eastern States in 1920.
- He went to BYU after his mission and met Helen Sine Thompson on 07 March 1935. They had four children..
- They made their home in Lehi at the Northwest corner of 100 East and 300 North.
- Wane had a Cabinet Shop on Main Street in Lehi 1939-1940. It was in the old Cotter Building at 102 West Main Street.

- David Clark was the son of William and Margaret Clark, and was born May 28, 1816, at Lincolnshire, England.
- He lost his first wife and two children in St. Louis by cholera.
- He was married to Miss Myra Williams, November 26, 1849, and as years rolled on they were blessed with six children, namely, James, David, Myra, Rachel, Annie, and Nelson.

- Lehi Resident who served in the Mormon Battalion 1846-47
- Came to Lehi in 1850
- Camped with the Henry Royle family at Stinkweed Springs on the Dry Creek.
- Moved to Sulphur Springs to join the group after three days.
- Member of the first settlement of Lehi at Sulphur Springs Winter 1850-51
- Built a home on the west side of the Old Lehi Fort in 1854.
- Organized and led first choir in Lehi
- Mission on the Rio Virgin River in Southern Utah.

Clark, James B.

- James B. Clark, the third member of the family of William Clark and Margaret Boardman, was born July 18, 1875, in Lehi Utah.
- November 25, 1895, at the age of twenty, James B. Clark married Armita Peterson in the Salt Lake Temple.
- Eleven children were born of this union: Jennive, Clara Margaret, James Leonard, Ella Armita, Rhoda Jane, Ora Mae, Elwyn Lloyd, John William, Elden Lester, and Leath.
- From January 15, 1902, until December 19, 1903, James served a mission to the Northern States leaving a wife and small children.
- After Lehi was divided into four wards, he was named counselor to Bishop John Stoker in the Fourth Ward and served twenty years.
- It was during his early years in the Bishopric that the construction on the Fourth Ward chapel began. He worked long and hard, the brunt of the responsibility for the building weighing heavily upon his shoulders.
- He was a member of the water board for many years and also was water master.
- He died on August 11, 1939.

Clark, Jane Stevenson Ross

- Jane Clark, daughter of Samuel and Emily Stevenson, was born in Canada, December 5, 1820.
- The two youngest children, born in 1846 and 1850, died in New Jersey in 1849 and 1850. Some believe that Steven became disenchanted with Mormonism and left the faith. Steven died in December 1849, ten months after the death of their fourth child and four months before the birth of their fifth, who died after two weeks.
- Jane Stevenson married Stephen Weeks Ross on 2 March 1839, in Newark, Essex County, New Jersey, where they became parents to five children, each born between 1840 and 1850. Mr. Ross died December 9, 1849.
- May 10, 1851, she started for Utah with her two sons and daughter, arriving in Council Bluffs in July. That same winter she met and married William Clark, a widower, by whom she had seven children, six girls and one boy
- The following spring they came on to Utah, making the trip with, a yoke of oxen and a yoke of cows, arriving in Salt Lake City in September. The summer of 1853 was spent on Cottonwood, and in the fall they moved to Lehi, which was her home till her death,
- William and Jane settled in Lehi, Utah Territory in 1854 where they together raised the three Ross children, seven of their own, and one adopted. William supported his large family as a farmer.
- She was a friend to the sick and needy, relieving many from their physical sufferings and contributing freely of her substance to the poor.
- Jane made her mark by tirelessly working in the Relief Society that was organized in 1868.
- Jane died 21 September 1895, in Lehi at the age of 74.

Clark, Myra Williams

- Mrs. Clark was born at Staffordshire, England, March 2, 1821. She was the only one of a family of fourteen to embrace the gospel. She came to America in 1849.
- At St. Louis she met David Clark, whom she afterwards married. While crossing the plains in 1850 she gave birth to her first son. They arrived in Lehi September 10. 1850.
- Member of the first settlement of Lehi at Sulphur Springs Winter 1850-51
- The Henry Royle and David Clark families, probably the first settlers (of Lehi), came over the Point of the Mountain on 10 September 1850 and followed Dry Creek southward, camping at what they called Stinkweed Springs, one mile east of Sulphur Springs.
- She was the first women to settle in Lehi. Other women did not come for a month after she came to Lehi.
- During the early days of Lehi, she took a very active part in the social features.
- She was loved and honored for the great work she did in nursing the sick and helping those in need.
- Blessed with six children, namely James, David, Myra, Rachel, Annie, and Nelson.
- Mrs. Clark died May 28, 1912, at the age of 91.

- During the winter of 1851, he married Mrs. Jane Stevenson Ross. The following spring they started for Utah, crossing the plains by ox team, and arriving in Salt Lake City in the fall. In the fall of 1853 he arrived in Lehi, three years after the first settlers.
- His home was on the site of the old athletic field, now the Legacy Center parking lot.
- He was the most well known plasterer in Lehi in the 1800's.
- Appointed chairman of the Plastering for the Lehi Meetinghouse 1855-60.
- Served as Lehi Council for a short time in 1861; appointed Alderman for the remainder of his term through 1862.
- Served as Lehi Councilor 1865-74; 1877-79; 1880; 1881-82
- Member of the Lehi Militia Group that fought in the Tintic War 1856. He was wounded in the lip.
- Member of the Second company of Lehi Militia who were called to Echo Canyon during the Utah War.
- Became wealthy raising sheep with partner William H. Winn. He also raised cattle stock.
- One of the primary proponents of the Lehi Commercial and Savings Bank in 1891.
- Organizer and Director of the People's Co-op
- Organizer and Director of the Lehi Irrigation Company
- He served a long time as the Lehi pound keeper.

- He was one of the largest investors in bringing the Canning Factory to Lehi. It was a failure and he lost a lot of money.
- He filed a mission to England in 1880 for the Mormon Church,
- Served as a Counselor to Bishop Thomas R. Cutler for 24 years.
- Patriarch of Alpine Stake
- Died 07 May 1910

Clark, William W.

- In 1896, he became the second Branch President of the North Branch.
- Served until the Branch was made a ward in 1903.

Coates, Edna Christma Lundgren

- Emma Christma Lundgren Coates was born April 27, 1878, in Lehi, Utah, a daughter of Peter and Netta Bentson Lundgren.
- She worked hard as a girl to work a living on their small farm.

- At the age of thirteen, she hired out to do washings for fifty cents a day.
- She also worked for her invalid grandmother until her death in 1893.
- She was married to Luther Coates, January 22, 1902, in the Salt Lake Temple.
- Luther worked several years in the mines in Scranton, Utah, at which time she took care of the farm and the children.
- She worked in the Third Ward Relief Society for twenty three years, thirteen years as treasurer, and ten years as counselor.
- She was the mother of six children: L. Carlos, Ethel Wyman, Lela Kalmar, Selma Bone, Delbert and Donald.
- She died May 4, 1942.

- Commissioner for the Utah County Housing Authority.
- High Councilman Lehi North Stake

Colledge, Joseph Henry

- Joseph H. Colledge, son of Joseph T.H. and Elizabeth Lewis Colledge, born May 23, 1850 in Tredegar, South Wales.
- He crossed the ocean with his parents in the old sailing vessel William Tapscott.
- In 1860 crossed the plains by ox team and arrived in Salt Lake City, October 5, 1861. He was ten years old. He came with the William Budge company.
- Six days later he moved to Lehi where he made his home.
- He was active in musical circles. In 1861, he became a snare drummer in Abraham Enough's Martial Band serving ten years.

- He also became a charter member of the Brass Band playing with them eighteen years throughout their existence.
- Mr. Colledge followed freighting and railroading as a young man, helping to build the U.P. R. R. from Medicine Row, Wyoming, the D. & R. G. Utah Southern and Salt Lake and Western railroads in Utah.
- He and Eleanor Jones were married June 21, 1899 in Lehi, by John Woodhouse.
- Mr. College was appointed Lehi's first watermaster in 1875, holding this appointment until his death.
- He worked at one time at the Tooele Smelter.
- He served as constable for eighteen years, county stray pound keeper, eighteen years, and Lehi stray pound keeper, sixteen years.
- He held the office of High Priest in the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints , confirmed upon him by the late S.L. Chipman.
- He was the father of 12 children.
- Joseph Died 20 August 1936 in Lehi, Utah. He was buried in the Lehi City Cemetery.

Colledge, Joseph T. H.

- September 13, 1847, in the Cathedral Church at Bangor Parish, he married Elizabeth Lewis.
- He crossed the ocean in 1860, on the ship, Wm. Tapscott, crossed the plains by ox team the same year, in Nephi Johnson's Company arriving in Salt Lake City, October 5, and in Lehi October 11.
- Member of the first Lehi Brass Band in 1871.
- On February 27, 1861, he was appointed city recorder, a position he held for 20 years.
- He taught school in the refurbished Meeting House,;

- He was Lehi's first Librarian, the library being in the upper room of the same building. First Librarian in 1865 through Lehi Library Association.
- February 8, 1869, he was appointed tax assessor and collector. in connection with recorder, and was the last toll keeper of the Jordan River bridge.
- He was the father of six children. Twins were buried in England, and a little girl on the plains. Joseph the oldest, crossed the plains with them, and Thomas and Hyrum were born in Lehi.
- He was a High Priest at the time of his death, which occurred very suddenly December 8, 1881. His official records were found up to date.

Colledge, Thomas

- Thomas Colledge, youngest son of Joseph T. H. and Elizabeth Lewis Colledge, was born November 1, 1866, in Lehi, Utah in a two-roomed adobe house on the corner of First south and First West .
- In 1878, the Colledge family moved to a sixty acre tract of land just north of the horse shoe bend of the River, the site of the present Colledge homestead. He was baptized March 20, 1880. During the summers of 1879-1880, he worked on the Norman brothers farm, spending the winters in the mines at Park City.
- Was a veteran of World War I.
- On July 4, 1893, he married Mary Ann Slater at Provo.
- He returned to the mines for one year, then came back to Lehi, and commenced farming and stock raising.
- He was a lover of solitude and nature, watching the migration of birds, and the changing of seasons. He spent his leisure time hunting and trapping and seldom leaving the farm.
- He was a friend to everyone.
- Indians often stopped there when traveling to Skull Valley in winter and Uintah in spring, knowing they would always be welcome.

- April 7, 1935, he had a partial stroke from which he never entirely recovered. A second stroke occurred at 3 A.M. Wednesday February 5, 1936. He died at 4:15 p.m. that same day.

Collett, Daniel

Collett, Sylvanus

- Came to Lehi in 1851
- Lehi Militia Group called to Echo Canyon later went to Wyoming to help Lott Smith antics.
- Member of the Lehi Militia Group that fought in the Tintic War 1856
- Moved to Plain City in Cache Valley.
- Served his life in the Nauvoo Militia

Collett, Thomas

- One of the three fiddlers who led the first parade of Lehi on the 24th of July 1854.
- His group also played that night in the Log Schoolhouse for a dance. The string trio played cotillion, jig, and quadrille music for dancing.

Comer, George L.

- George Austin plants the first Sugar Beets on land owned by George Comer Spring of 1891.
- Lehi City Council Member 1904-05

Comer, Heber Carter

- Heber was born in 11 April 1859 in Machen Wales England.
- He immigrated from Wales in 1866.
- He came across the Plains in the William Henry Chipman Company in 1866.
- He arrived in Lehi as a boy with his parents.
- He attended Lehi Public School and also attended Brigham Young Academy.
- When he was a young boy he apprenticed with the Peoples Cooperative cobbler Richard Gilchrist.
- He married Helen Elsie Titcomb in 27 April 1884 in Salt Lake.
- He had three sons: George, James and Eldon.
- He opened a shoe shop at 126 West Main in 1895. The following year he erected a small building on the northwest corner where his home was.
- Heber Comer was Lehi's first Iceman.
- For more than fifteen years his ice was from Utah Lake. But this was poor quality, smelling of fish and not suitable for drinks or ice cream making.
- In 1898, purchased Simmons Pond at 651 East Second South. This is the site of the present Larsen's Nursing Home. He drained it and then filled it with water from artesian wells he dug in the area.
- He also built a large ice house to the east of the pond at the same site.
- The Pond ice was harvested in January and February when it was frozen to the depth of two feet. The Pond was first scraped smooth by horse drawn rig.
- Holes were then punched through the surface with axes so the huge crosscut saws could cut the ice into squares. Ice cakes, often weighing two hundred pounds or more were grappled from the freezing
- To preserve for summer use, and to prevent the cakes from freezing together, layers of sawdust were used for insulation.

- During the summer months, when the demand for ice was greatest, Comer and his sons hauled ice as far away as the mining camps of Sunshine and Mercur.
- First owner of the property at 116 West Main
- He built his home at first East and 100 north where the Lehi Fifth Ward church.
- The Lehi Fifth Ward bought the home from Heber Comer in 1921 for \$3,000.
- The Ward tore out the walls and made a large room. They installed a stairs and made two class rooms upstairs. It was called the Comer Cathedral.
- The Comer Cathedral was razed in 1928.
- Heber Comer established the first Mercantile in Lehi Junction in 1881 on Railroad Street.
- It was burglarized by William H Colton. There was hardly anything in the store. The burglar got some loose change and a pouch of tobacco.
- Comer sold the store in 1890.
- Built a building as a rental on the property. It has always been known as the Comer Building since.
- Heber Comer purchase a piece of property from Joseph Dorton at 116 West Main and erected a 24X50” brick building.
- Comer first operated his ice cream business at his home on 95 East and 100 North (Lehi Fifth Ward Church)
- A Lehi Banner Ad urged people to go to H, C. Comer’s Ice Cream Parlors, for you ice cream, fine confectionery, summer drinks, assorted nuts, tobaccos and Cigars. Ice Cream can be deliver to any order at any time.
- When Ord Brothers Clothing Store vacated their premises at 101 West Maine in June 1897, Comer moved his Ice Cream Parlor there.
- Later it was reestablished in his old Shoe shop on First East.
- From 1897-1900 he ran a Ice Cream Parlor at 101 West Main Street. He had several ice cream parlors in Lehi. When electricity came to town in 1900, he made the first ice cream in Lehi using an electric freezer.
- Well drilling and Comer are synonymous in Lehi History. Heber and his sons James and Elson began drilling wells in the Lehi area in the early

1920's.

- Heber Carter Comer invented a self-feeder extension for threshing-machines. It was patent US 1198701 A.
- In those days most wells were 2-5 inches Today they are as big as twenty inches in diameter.
- Died in Lehi on the 15 April 1944.

Comer, James Heber

- James Heber Comer, son of Heber and Helen Elsie Comer, was born August 30, 1886, in Lehi, Utah.
- He was educated in the public schools of Lehi and when a very small boy, he helped his father deliver ice to Sunshine and Mercur.
- He was a well digger and a machine thrasher operator.
- In 1930, he built the Comer Garage, which he owned and operated alone, and selling Allis-Chalmers tractors and farm machinery.
- He taught Auto Mechanics at American Fork for the O.S.Y. and at Provo for the N.Y.A.
- He was a charter member of the Lehi Lions Club, and the Lehi Riding Club.
- He married Francis Jane Jones September 30, 1907 and two sons and two daughters were born to them: James Harold, Nola May, Francis Edward, and Shirley LaRae.
- He met with an automobile accident, January 25, 1945, and was in the Lehi and Latter-day Saint hospitals, six weeks, while his son Francis, who had been wounded in the Bulge in Germany, was in an Army hospital in Madison, California.
- He died March 14, 1945 in the L.D.S. Hospital in Salt Lake.

Comer, Paul

- The most successful well digger in Utah
- Had the first color television in Lehi

Comer, Frances Jane Jones

- Frances Jane Jones, daughter of Edward Henry, and Alice Jane Perry Jones, was born July 28, 1899, in Lehi, Utah.
- When Frances was nine months old her father, who was a fireman on the Union Pacific railroad, was killed at Cedar Fort, Utah leaving her mother

with four little girls to raise.

- She was educated in the public schools of Lehi.
- She was a teacher for three years and a chorister for seven years in the Primary Association, and secretary for nine years in the Relief Society of the Lehi Fifth Ward.
- She was vice-president of the Parent Teachers Association in the Lehi District for two years.
- She married James Heber Comer, September 30, 1907. She is the mother of four children: James Harold, Nola May, Francis Edward, and Shirley LaRae.
- She is a member of the choir and of the singing mothers of the Lehi Fifth Ward and a Relief Society teacher.

- Had the first color television in Lehi

Commander, James

- They had one daughter Caroline.
- She had worked in Lehi at Wattie's Cafe, Leany's Mercantile, and Lehi Drug, She was a great customer service representative.
- She was a guide for the John Hutchings Museum for many years and was one of the most knowledgeable people on the history of Lehi and Pioneer History. Back in her day they took the patrons on a tour and told them about the exhibits.
- She belonged to the Singing Mothers Choir of Lehi.
- She belonged for many years to the Daughters of the Utah Pioneers.
- She was very devoted to John Hutchings.
- She served in the Stake Young Women and a life time in the Ward Choir.
- She was instrumental in starting the "Pink Ladies" service in the American Fork Hospital.
- She was known for her poetry and her handiwork, including knitting, crochet, tatting, quilting, and sewing.

- Businessmen Thomas R. Cutler, Ira D. Wines, and William J. Racker built and established the Union Hotel in 1891. Wines bought them out in 1908.
- Director of the Lehi Commercial and Savings Bank.
- Elected Lehi Alderman in 1877-79.
- Lehi City Councilor 1879
- Lehi City Treasurer 1877-79
- Director of the Provo Woolen Mills.
- The appropriate ceremonies placed in position the cornerstone of the Lehi Tabernacle by Bishop Thomas R. Cutler. September 12, 1901.
- One of the primary proponents of the Lehi Commercial and Savings Bank in 1891.
- Instrumental in the creation of the Union Hotel, Provo Woolen Mills, Cutler Brothers, Utah State National Bank and Continental Life Insurance Company.
- President of the Utah County Medical Society in 1925
- Moved to Salt Lake in 1903 because of all his business interests.
- In his later life he spent the winters in Long Beach California, where he had a heart attack and died on 03 April 1922.
- His funeral was held in the Salt Lake Tabernacle. His body was returned to Lehi and buried in the Lehi Cemetery.

Dahl, Maurice "Brig"

- He was born June 3, 1919 in Lehi, Utah, son of August LeRoy and Blanche

Elizabeth Jacobs Dahl.

- He married Donna Marie Holmstead, June 11, 1948 in Lehi.
- Brig joined the National Guard prior to WWII.
- He was a Green Beret during World War II
- Brig was a veteran of World War II and made the military his life's career, retiring as a Warrant Officer from the Army and Utah National Guard.

- Brig was a member of the Jaycees organization and served as its President
- He was humble, a friend to all and every bit a gentleman.
- Maurice J "Brig" Dahl, age 86 of Lehi, died August 23, 2005 at his home of cancer.

Davis, Ryan Dr.

- Local Lehi Dentist and Businessman
- Lehi Student Body President 1976

Davis, Sarah Ellen Stewart

- Born February 2, 1847
- Emigrated to Utah in 1852
- Married Elisha Hildebrand Davis Jr. in the Endowment House on January 31, 1871.
- Known as “Lexie”
- Mother of Nine children
- Died December 1932

Dawson, William

- William Dawson was born on the 17 April 1813 in Alston Cumberland England.
- Part of the Lehi Militia called to defend Fort Limhi against the Indians March 8, 1858
- Called by Lehi Residence as “Uncle Billy”

- He went to West Canyon and cut down a magnificent eighty foot tree which was erected for the celebration in 1856.
- Put up the Liberty Pole for the July 1856 celebration.
- It was on the Northeast corner of the Meeting House for 36 years. It held the flag until it was too insecure. The placing of the flag was changed and a new pole put up.
- The fourth of July in 1876 on the anniversary of the Declaration of Independence, Billy Dawson was in charge of the one hundred gun salute. At this time Billy Dawson had a long grey beard. The salute went fine until the climax. All the young men who were shooting the guns got excited and started shooting before the climax. At the same time Uncle Billy had planned to fire off an anvil, a popular pioneer custom consisting of igniting a charge of black powder under a heavy blacksmith anvil. When the appointed time only the firing of the anvil and Billy was so upset at the boys he gave some inappropriate words.
- He was sent to save the handcart companies. No sooner had these men of Lehi helped the handcart companies to safety than they received another call to assist an independent immigration company which was in distress at Fort Bridger. Brigham Young requested Bishop Evans to fit out a relief expedition and proceed to the assistance of the unfortunates with all possible speed. A company of twenty men with teams and ten wagons provided with provisions and feed was the response. The captain of these men was Joseph Skeens and some of his companions were Alonzo D. Rhodes, Abraham Brown, Samuel Cousens, Newel A. Brown, Riley Judd, Henry McConnell, Paulinus H. Allred, and William Dawson.

This company left Lehi on December 10. On account of the great drifts of snow which they encountered in the mountains, they could travel with only great difficulty and very slowly. Finally, however, they reached Fort Bridger and found the immigrants on the verge of starvation. Their provisions were exhausted and their teams so poor that they could not continue their journey. The arrival of the company from Lehi saved them from a most pitiable condition and the possibility of death from starvation.

- Joined the Church and sent his wife Emma ahead. Joseph's wife Emma came to Utah with them and while fording a river was drowned, they never had any children.
- He came later to Utah.
- He came with Captain Israel Evans' HandCart Company. Brother and Sister William Ball and family of Lehi came in the same company. How many times we have heard Sister Ball say how good Joseph was to them and the rest of the company, when their feet were so sore and bleeding, he would let them take turns riding in his wagon and would go out and kill buffalo and deer, dress the animals, cut them up in pieces, and share the meat with them all.
- Moves to Lehi in 1855 and becomes Lehi's first butcher.
- After moving to Lehi, he met Martha Clayton and was married in April 1858,

- The day after they were married he was called to go with a bunch of men some place north to fight the Indians for several weeks.
- Had the First Slaughterhouse and Butcher shop
- First family to move outside the Fort Wall
- When he returned he heard of the Stagecoach Line, or Pony Express, coming through, so he went to Salt Lake to get a contract for keeping the Pony Express horses. He obtained the contract and the next spring he and his good wife, Martha and son, Joseph, Jr., only two months old, left the old fort Wall in Lehi, 1860 and moved over on the Divide between Lehi and Camp Floyd.
- Had remarkable skill in dealing with the indians
- Joseph built a rock house and a dugout and a log barn to house the pony express horses. The dugout was used for hired help to sleep in. Their hired man was an Indian who took care of the pony Express horses, who fed and curried them. Joseph and wife fed the Indian and he slept in the dugout.
- Joseph dug a well 360 feet deep, but never could find water, so they hauled all their water from the river.
- Was the conductor of the stage line between Cedar Fort and Salt Lake.
- At this time Johnson's Army had moved to Camp Floyd. Joseph started a small grocery store and sold groceries and supplies to the soldiers, his wife, Martha, was a good cook and made pies, cakes and bread to sell, and they sold water for 25 cents a bucket.
- One night about midnight there came a hard knock on their door, Joseph asked "who's there", the Indians answered a friend, "me heap sick". So Joseph got out of bed and opened the door, it was Black Hawk, the big Indian Chief. He had been shot and the bullet had cut through the skin and flesh across the abdomen, he was bleeding and holding himself with his arm. Joseph told him to lie down, he cleansed the parts and with a needle and strong thread sewed up the wound. Joseph invited him to stay in the dugout with the other Indian all night, but in the morning he was gone.
- In 1868 Joseph moved back to Lehi where he conducted a meat market in the Lehi Exchange, which soon after became the Old Co-op Store.
- Purchased 126 West Main and established a Meat Market in 1882 there.
- His Son Joseph E. Dorton purchased the property at 120 West Main in 1886.

- From 1892-1894 Joseph and his son built a two story adobe building on 120 West Main and Opened up the Dorton Brothers Meat Market.
- They closed their business in 1901.
- He died in Lehi, Utah 03 November 1898 at the age of 77.

Dorton, Joseph E.

- Son of Joseph Dorton, Lehi's first butcher.
- He purchased the property at 120 West Main in 1886.
- From 1892-1894 Joseph and his son built a two story adobe building on 120 West Main and Opened up the Dorton Brothers Meat Market.
- They closed their business in 1901.
- Sold the Dorton Building at 120 West Main in 1924
- Built a new building at 46 West Main in 1901
- Dorton maintained the meat market at 46 West Main until 1904.

Dorton, Martha Clayton

- Moved to Lehi in 1856
- Member of the First Lehi Choir in 1852

Dorton, William

- Joined the Dorton family Butcher shop after the declines of their father Joseph health in 1886. Worked with his brother Joseph E. and George.

- Director Lehi Civic Improvement Association 1947-58

- Lehi City Council Member 1971-1976
- President Lehi Civic Improvement Association 1986-88

Dransfield, Albert

- First family to use the original Se-go Lily School as a residence in 1929.
- Lived there until their deaths.

Dransfield, Jennive Clark

- Jennive was born August 23, 1896 in the home of her grandfather William Clark in Lehi.
- Was a student at the original Sego Lily school
- Taught at the Sego Lily School
- Married Albert Dransfield December 17, 1919.
- First family to use the original Sego Lily School as a residence in 1929.
- James Clark purchased the school for \$410 for his daughter.
- She lived there until her death.
- She died on 11 September 1981.

Driggs, William S.

- Member of the first settlement of Lehi at Sulphur Springs Winter 1850-51
- Hired Hand of David Savage, brought by him to Lehi.

Dubois, Kenneth

- Lehi High School Student Body President 1963

Durfey, F. Haws

- Opened the Durfey Dry Cleaning Plant at 217 East State in March 1950.
