Mackay, Brent

- Opened the First Arctic Circle In Lehi on State Street in 1953

Madden, James

- During World War II he was on the battleship Missouri when the Japanese surrendered. It was on August 31, 1945. The Battleship Missouri was named after the home state of President Harry Truman. It weighed 45000 tons and was one of the most powerful battleships of World War II. This was its last mission.

Malan, Nahum Oscar

- He was born in Ogden on April 7 1886
- Created the first private Gas Station in May 1921. It was on the Southeast Corner of Center and State.
- Officially Malan Service, most people called this place the ‘Keep off the Grass’ station because of the jocular sign Malan had hung over a miniscule plot of sod near the gas pump.
- He had a hot dog confectionery downtown also.
- Ran a Funeral Parlor at 169 West Main for a short period of time.
- Purchased the Lehi Commercial and Savings Bank Building and opened a funeral parlor and crematory at the facility. It was open from 1923-1925. (This was the old hospital)
- Malan also sold his “Keep off the Grass” service station in August 1924
- In 1925, Dr. Fred Worlton purchased the Bank and converted it into the Lehi Hospital.
- Malan moved back to his home town of Ogden.
- Died 19 January 1974

Mallet, Henry

- Veteran of the Black Hawk War 1865-67

Manning, J. Dale

- First Lehi Fifteenth Ward Bishop 1979-83

Martins, Jessie B.

- Lehi Resident who served in the Mormon Battalion 1846-47

Matthews, William

- Veteran of the Black Hawk War 1865-67

Maugh, Robert

- Member of the Second company of Lehi Militia who were called to Echo Canyon during the Utah War.

Mayberry, Abraham

- Hired as a Carpenter to help build the Lehi City Park Pavilion in 1900 at 100 North and 500 West

McConnell, Elizabeth Gustin

- Member of the first settlement of Lehi at Sulphur Springs Winter 1850-51

McConnell, George

- Member of the first settlement of Lehi at Sulphur Springs Winter 1850-51
- Part of a Brigham Young called Lehi team to go to Winter Quarters and bring LDS converts to Utah 1861-66

McConnell, Henry

- Member of the first settlement of Lehi at Sulphur Springs Winter 1850-51.
- Part of the Lehi Militia called to defend Fort Limhi against the Indians March 8, 1858
- Member of the Lehi Dramatic Association in 1854.

McConnell, Jehiel

- Born in Indiana on July 1, 1814.
- In 1834 he married Nancy Barratt. They had four children.
- He came across the plains in 1849 with the Allen Taylor Company. He came with his wife and four boys.
- Member of the first settlement of Lehi at Sulphur Springs Winter 1850-51. He came with his wife and three sons, Henry, George and William.
- Built a home on the North side of the Old Lehi Fort in 1854
- Original Ward Clerk to Bishop David Evans in 1851.
- He served as the Tithing Clerk in 1854
- In 1852, he became the First Counselor to Bishop David Evans.
- Called by Brigham Young to settle Southern Utah in 1853; Released as second counselor to Bishop Evans.
- Served a missionary to the Native Americans.
- Brother Jehiel McConnell was one of the party who were with Elder George

A. Smith Jr. when he was killed by the Navajo Indians. When George A. was wounded and the party had to retreat, Brother McConnell got onto his big mule behind the saddle, took George A. in his arms in front of him, and carried him until he died; thus manifesting a love and loyalty to his wounded brother that always endeared the man to the people of Orderville."

- He was known as a peacekeeper.
- Report of the 35th Quorum of Seventies - lists Jehiel McConnell in Cedar City in 1856
- Died in Orderville, Utah 22 January 1878.

Meiling, J.O.

- Lehi City Recorder 1928-29; 1934-35

Mellor, Carl

- Lehi Elementary 5th Grade Teacher
- Segoe Lily Principal
- Lehi 14th Ward Bishop 1977-1984
- Lehi Businessman-Mellor's Catering
- Lehi City Council member
- Reestablished the Sons of the Utah Pioneers in Lehi
- Officer Lehi Sons of the Utah Pioneers.
- Lehi Historian and Donor to the Lehi City Historical Archives.

- Member of the Lehi Historical Preservation Commission
- One of the original members of the Friends of Camp Floyd.
- Historical Preservationist-"Lehi Hotel" Purchased it with his wife in 1997
- Lehi Historical Tour Guide
- Tour Guide for Israel and the Biblical Areas.

Mellor, Dimple

- Married Carl Mellor
- Lehi Businessman-Mellor's Catering
- Historical Preservationist-"Lehi Hotel" Purchased it with his husband in 1997
- Died in 2013.

Mendenhall, Florence

- Member of the Lehi Auctus Club.

Mercer, Charles Emmett

- Born in American Fork
- Served in World War I.
- Served at the Quartermaster Fort at Fort Keogh near Miles City in Montana breaking horses. Discharged in 1919.
- Married Lehi girl Geneve Evans and moved to Lehi.
- Purchased the William Yates home at 100 East and 200 North.

Mercer, John

- Built a home on the west side of the Old Lehi Fort in 1854.

Mercer, Julian

- Correspondent for the Daily Herald for many years writing historical pieces about Lehi.
- Member of the Lehi Historical Preservation Commission for many years and currently.
- Large donor to the Lehi City Historical Archives. See his writings on the web pages.
- Tenth Ward Emergency Preparedness Chairman during the floods of 1982-83.
- Member of the Lehi National Guard for many years.
- Candidate for Mayor of Lehi.

Merrell, George

- Lehi Militia Group called to Echo Canyon later went to Wyoming to help

Lott Smith antics.

- Part of the Lehi Militia called to defend Fort Limhi against the Indians
March 8, 1858

Merrill, Fred

- Manager of the Plastering for the Lehi Tabernacle.

Merrihew, E.C.

- Leased the John Beck home in 1890.
- Lehi Dentist
- Purchased the property at 72 West Main in 1898 expanding Main Street from between 100 and 200 West.
- The property had originally been part of the Anders Peterson homestead.
- The Dental Office was 18 X 20 foot size.
- The brickwork was done by Andrew Fjeld and Charles Ohran and were the probable builders of the Business.
- He was one of the most trained dentists of the time.
- He advertised using gas nitrous oxide.
- He sold the business to Dr. Walter T. Hasler.

Merrihew, Florence Donahue

- Florence D. Merrihew was born in Springfield Illinois on the 1 March 1872
- When eight years old, her parents moved to Omaha, Nebraska, where she received her education in public schools; later attending the Academy of the Sacred Heart, where she studied painting, etc. having made painting and writing of poetry her hobby.
- She joined the First Baptist Church of Omaha, when twelve years old, and thereafter was active in social and religious work. She taught in a Mission Sunday School of which her mother was one of the organizers and benefactors, and which later became The Child's Saving Institute.
- Her family moved to Salt Lake where she was a member of the Ladies Literary Club for several years.
- She married Robert Craig in 1900. He died in 1905.
- February 1, 1913 she married H. Bert Merrihew and moved to Lehi.
- She and her husband built the Merrihew building on Main Street.
- She was a member of the Athenian club for over thirty years, and served as president, secretary and was treasurer for eight years. She wrote the words for the Club Song entitled, "Our Treasures". Mrs Harold (Rene) Christensen

having written the music, which won first prize from the State Federated Clubs.

- She was active in Red Cross and civic work;
- Served on the Library Board for several years,
- Designed the fountain in Wines Park, an Athenian Club project, same was erected by committees and club participation.
- She passed away July 26, 1947 in Lehi.

Merrihew, Harry Bert.

- Was born in Des Moines Iowa
- Received other schooling in Iowa
- During the history of Lehi, there were several Lehi Drug Stores.
- Merrihew Drug Store was the second Lehi Drug Store.
- Harry Bert Merrihew graduated from the Des Moines Iowa Highland park College of Pharmacy.
- He arrived in Lehi in 1907
- Initially he established his business at 150 West Main. (Garff Building) This proved unsatisfactory.
- Three years later in 1910 he purchased the Joyce property at 98 West Main.
- He built a two-story 40 X 50 foot structure with walls four bricks thick.
- He converted the upstairs as a lodge room for the Odd Fellows and the Modern Woodmen of the World fraternal orders.
- Merrihew had the finest soda fountain in the city's history. The intricate walnut cabinet where soda glasses were stored is presently displayed in the Hutchings Museum. This ornate item featured a large arched mirror backdrop and a marble countertop.
- February 15, 1913 he married Florence D. Craig of Salt Lake City, Utah. Mr. Merrihew then established a permanent home in Lehi.
- On September of 1917, Merrihew sold the Lehi Drug Store to John Franklin Bradshaw and his brother-in-law Gerald R. Taylor.

Messersmith, Thomas Henry

- Born in Cedar Fort March 1, 1866

- Married Antomina Ottesen in Lehi on 01 May 1889
- Lived in Lehi west of the Old Fifth Ward Church until his death.
- Died on first of August 1939 and buried in the Lehi Cemetery.

Millard, Chauncey

- Murdered Harlan P. Sweat freighter from New Hampshire near Saratoga on 11 December 1868.

Miller, Clifford

- Ran the Royal Theater from 1928 with his father until his fathers death in 1950.
- Cliff ran the Royal Theater from 1950 until his retirement in 1976. He was involved in the Royal Theater for nearly 50 years.

Miller, Elmer

- Lehi High School Principal 1918-1920

Miller, John Clifford

- John Clifford Miller was born February 11, 1909, a son of John H. Miller and May Openshaw Miller at Mammoth, Utah.
- As a young boy, Cliff operated the machines in his father's theater and has been in the Theater business ever since that time.
- He married Thelma Read, daughter of Dr. H. R. Read and Maud Curry, and to them were born four sons, Read, Dale, Neil and Craig.
- In 1925, he and his family moved to American Fork, Utah, three years later they moved to Lehi where they have lived ever since.
- Cliff was a director in the Lehi Lions Club for four years, and president of the Lions Club in 1949.
- Since moving to Lehi, and taking over the Royal Theater, which was formerly operated by the Old People's Cooperative, the Millers have remodeled and built the Royal Theater until it is now one of the most modern and best equipped theaters in Utah County.
- Manager of the Royal Theater, Lehi, Utah from May 1929, until his retirement
- He died on February 13, 1998

Miller, John H.

- Purchased the Royal Theater in 1928 and ran the Theater with his son Cliff until his death in 1950. He turned it over to his son.

- Lehi North Stake Presidency 1983-
- President Utah National Parks Council Boy Scouts of America
- Lehi Dentist

Miner, Bonnie Larsen

- Founding Member of the Lehi Serimpian Club in 1949

Mitchell, Beverly

- Charter Member of the Letitian Club 1952

Mitchell, Dale

- Lehi Seventh Ward Bishop 1983-84
- Lehi Eighteenth Ward Bishop 1984-1989

Mitchell, David Richard

- David Richard Mitchell, was born in American Fork, Utah, August 10, 1888.
- He received his elementary education in American Fork, high school and college at Brigham Young University He graduated in 1911, and has done graduate work at Chicago, Brigham Young University and Utah.
- He moved to Lehi in 1920, served eighteen years as principal. Lehi High School Principal 1921-1939
- Superintendent of Alpine School District in 1938.
- He has served in the Stake Mutual and Sunday School boards in North Sevier, Alpine and Lehi Stakes.
- Lehi Boy Scout Commissioner from 1921 until 1929.
- Secretary of the Mitchell Hollow Irrigation Company.
- President, and also secretary of the Utah High School Athletic Association.
- Member of the National High School Rules committee twelve years,
- President and Charter Member of the Lehi Lions Club.
- On the Board of Directors of Timpanogos Knife and Fork Club.
- Director of the State Bank of Lehi.
- Mr. Mitchell married Miss Martha Glazier, daughter of Charles Albert and May Smoot Glazier of Provo, June 10, 1914.
- They have four children; all have completed requirements for Bachelors or Masters Degrees from various universities.

Moorehead, Elizabeth Thomas

- She and her husband joined the church in Mississippi. They owned great plantations with slaves. When they left to join the Saints in Nauvoo, they granted freedom to the slaves. One slave who had raised her would not leave her.
- Her husband, 2 children and a brother died coming across the plains.
- Member of the first settlement of Lehi at Sulphur Springs Winter 1850-51
- Her family was without shoes that first winter and their clothes woefully patched.
- Made furniture by hand.
- In Lehi she and her brother Preston, who later became the first Bishop of Franklin, taught school in a log house - she taught the girls in one end and her brother taught the boys in the other end of the room.
- She married Samuel White and they moved to Cedar Fort. It was not a happy marriage.
- Her husband was away from home in Cedar City
- The journey across the plains had seemed like a pleasure trip in comparison, but the years spent in Cedar Fort so surpassed all other difficulties they had

had, that the memory was a trauma the rest of their lives even to their very small children. The Indians were a constant threat. They pilfered food, chickens, lambs, calves and even on occasion drove away the only horses the settlers owned.

- The wind blew constantly and the little stream that came down from the mountains trickled out about the middle of July, so the only vegetables they could raise were the very early varieties. The ground became pulverized and the constant wind kept the air filled with a fine dust which sieved through the tightest houses, covering everything with a fine white powder. Then there were grasshoppers by the thousands devouring any green leaf that might be left. The well that had been dug dried up during the summer and the water for domestic use had to be hauled from Lehi.
- Moved to American Fork when the soldiers came to Camp Floyd (move South).
- Called to move to Smithfield.
- Was the first Relief Society President of Smithfield.

Moorehead, Preston

- Member of the first settlement of Lehi at Sulphur Springs Winter 1850-51
- In Lehi she and her brother Preston, who later became the first Bishop of Franklin, taught school in a log house - she taught the girls in one end and her brother taught the boys in the other end of the room.

Mulliner, Samuel Jr.

- Born in Scotland 15 January 1809.
- Tanner and a Shoemaker by trade.
- Married Catherine Nisbet. They emigrated from Scotland to Canada.
- Joined the LDS Church in Canada. Left for Kirtland as he joined.
- He was the first missionary called to preach the gospel in Scotland and was the first man to baptize converts in Scotland.
- He was an ordinance worker in the Nauvoo Temple
- He was polygamous.
- Settled in Salt Lake in 1850.
- Purchased the property where Walker Bank stood.
- Turned over the property to the United order in 1876.
- Constructed Deseret Tannery in 1850 after his arrival in Salt Lake. The

tannery was successful in making the first leather in the state.

- Sold his interest in the Tannery to John R. Winder in 1855.
- Moved to American Fork and purchased a grist Mill in American Fork and had carding mill and a sugar cane mill making molasses.
- Mulliner Mill is built and completed by the Mill Pond in 1858.
- He created the Mill Pond.
- Completed his Grist Mill next to the Large Springs in 1849-1850.
- Arranged for Brigham Young to visit the mill.
- Brigham Young advised him to build a dam across the ravine where the stream from the Springs exited southward toward Utah Lake.
- In 1856, he did dam work on the mill pond and constructed a 2 story Grist Mill on the west bank of Spring Creek.
- The Utah War and the soldiers halted the construction of the mill, but soon he was back finishing the project. Miller Estram Kelsey became the first miller at the Mulliner's Mill in 1858.
- Elisha H. Davis replaced Estram Kelsey as miller in 1859.
- He was upset by the lack of leadership on the United Order. He received permission from Brigham Young to move.
- Moved to Orderville in 1877 to live the United Order. He worked on a Gristmill for Orderville in Glendale. He was a positive speaker in defence of the United Order. He also built a Tannery in Orderville. He was the foreman. His two enterprises was the most successful in the Order.
- Samuel Mulliner was getting real deaf in 1879, and so Orderville released him from his grist mill and Tannery duties.
- He left the United Order and moved to Kanarrville in late 1879. One of his wives stayed in the Order.
- In 1884 Samuel Mulliner sold the Mill to Thaddeus Powell.
- He moved to Lehi and at the time of his death was living in the little house that he built for Mary Ann in Lehi.
- Resided in Lehi the rest of his life.
- Samuel Mulliner, at the time of his death, is described as an "Old Man, hard of hearing, living alone in Lehi, in the area where he had such high hopes of seeing a Latter-day Saint group join together in the Cooperative type of living.
- He died on the 25 February 1891 in Lehi.

Murdock, George W.

- Created Murdock Resort on Utah Lake May 30, 1891.

Murdock, John Sr,

- Built a home on the south side of the Old Lehi Fort in 1854.

Murdock, John Riggs

- Family settled in Lehi in 1851
- Built a home on the south side of the Old Lehi Fort in 1854.
- Brought first Apple and Peach Trees to Lehi with James W. Taylor and John R. Murdock in Spring 1855
- Served as Lehi Alderman 1854-55
- Lehi's 3rd Mayor 1861-1862
- Served in the Mormon Battalion 1846-47
- Sent by Brigham Young to help ill fated Handcart companies in November 1856.
- Led eleven parties from Lehi to bring LDS converts to Utah 1861-1866
- Held the record of crossing the plains in 15 days.
- Called by Brigham Young in 1864 to be Bishop of Beaver, Utah. He moved from Lehi to Beaver. Served as Beaver Bishop from 1864-1877
- Beaver Stake President 1877-1891
- Served 8 terms in the Territorial Legislature
- Served 1 term in the State Legislature
- Established the Murdock Academy in Beaver; a branch of the Brigham Young Academy.
- Beaver county Probate Judge
- Colonel in the Beaver County Military District.
- Buried in Beaver, Utah.

Murdock, Orrice

- Served in the Mormon Battalion 1846-47
- Family settled in Lehi in 1851
- Built a home on the south side of the Old Lehi Fort in 1854.

Musser, Mary White

- Member of the first settlement of Lehi at Sulphur Springs Winter 1850-51

Myers, Joel

- Lehi City Councilor 1894-95

Naegle, John Conrad

- Lehi Resident who served in the Mormon Battalion 1846-47
- Settled the Cold Spring area when he first came to Lehi in 1854
- Made fortune from Gold Mines in California
- Member of the Mormon Battalion
- Purchased the Saratoga area in 1854
- Sold the parcel of ground for the Relief Society Hall in 1880 at 212 West Main.
- Lehi Councilor 1861-62

Nattress, David E.

- Lehi Fourth Ward Bishop 1989-

Neil, John

- Member of the Lehi Dramatic Association in 1854.

Neilson, Lynette Schow

- Lehi Studentbody President 1979
- Lehi Bank Teller First Security Bank and Central Bank

Nielson, Connie Kirkham

- Married Glen Nielson
- Purchased the Home and Business at 35-45 West Main. with her husband
- Opened Genie Scarf in the 60's
- Changed the Business to This and That in November 1970
- Now operates two "Bridal Centers"- one in Provo and one in Lehi
- Celebrated the 50th Anniversary of the Business in 2013
- Served as Lehi State Young Women President
- Served as Chairman of the Lehi Historical Preservation Commission and on the committee.
- Served on the commission that restored the Union Pacific Railroad Depot.
- Served as President of the Lehi Chamber of Commerce.
- Large donor to the Lehi City Historical Archives.

Nielson, Donald V.

- Lehi First Ward Bishop 1974-1980

Nielson, Gary

- Owner and Operator of Colonial House from 1979-2010.

Nielson, Glen

- Purchased the Home and Business at 35-45 West Main.
- 1956-1959 he was a barber at Hotel Utah and the Regal Barber Shop.

- Opened Glen's Barbershop at 35 West Main on 14 February 1959
- Cut hair there until 1969
- Opened a Wig business in Salt Lake City in the fall of 1969.
- Glen's Barbershop closed down in 1970.

Nielson, Marilyn Anderson

- Accomplished Piano and Organist. Recorded an album of Piano Music.
- Headed the committee for the David Evans statue that is the Legacy Park.
- Director of the Lehi City Senior Citizens for many years.
- Officer of the Daughters of the Utah Pioneers for many years.

Nielson, Vernon K

- First Lehi Seventh Ward Bishop 1952-1958

Norberg, Lester M.

- Lehi Fourth Ward Bishop 1945-1948

- Owner Western Tac and Togs

- In 1898 Contractor with Andrew Fjeld for the E.C. Merrihew Building at 72 West Main. The beautiful brick work is still there

Olmstead, Harold K.

- Born in Lehi in 1894
- Enlisted in the Air Force on January 20, 1917
- Casualty of World War I-Died in a plane crash in 1919.

Olmstead, Loren

- Veteran of the Black Hawk War 1865-67

Olmstead, Phillip

- Family settled in Lehi in 1852
- Built a home on the North side of the Old Lehi Fort in 1854

Olsen, Arlene

- Purchased the Cooperative building at 197 East State in 1967 and established Outpost Antiques.
- Purchased the Comer Building and the Evans Cafe and moved Outpost Antiques to Main Street (116 West Main) in 1984.
- Married Wallace Olsen

Olsen, Wallace

- Purchased the Cutler Mansion and restored the beautiful home.
- Purchased the Cooperative building at 197 East State in 1967 and established Outpost Antiques.
- Purchased the Comer Building and the Evans Cafe and moved Outpost Antiques to Main Street (116 West Main) in 1984.

Olsterloh, Carl

- Opened Senate Shooting Gallery and Amusements in the Senate Building in

1898. It lasted just a short time.

- It was at 169 West Main Street

- Shepherd west of Lehi.

Otterson, P. Hugh

- Bishop Lehi First Ward 1962-1968
- Lehi City Councilmember 1954-65
- Opened Gateway Furniture store in 1953 at 189 West Main.

Packer, Nathan

- Built the First Mill at the Mouth of American Fork Canyon in December 1851

Palmer, Donald S.

- First Lehi Eleventh Ward Bishop 1973-1979.
- Helped on the Eagle Project of Jay D. Hadfield who built a Map, Blueprint and Plan Holder for the Lehi Historical Archives.

Parker, Teddy B.

- Bishop Lehi Sixth Ward 1959-1966

Partridge, Charles

- Built a home on the west side of the Old Lehi Fort in 1854.

Partridge, Jonathan

- Sent by Brigham Young to help ill fated Handcart companies in November 1856.

Pearce, David

- Veteran of the Black Hawk War 1865-67

Powell, Thaddeus

- Thaddeus Powell was born at the Point of the Mountain on September 30, 1854.
- When he was two years old, his family moved to Lehi.
- He grew up working sheep.
- He married Esther Ann Ashton on January 24, 1853. They were the parents of five children. They had a very large wedding and most everyone in town came to the wedding.
- They moved into a comfortable home two blocks south of the old church.
- Went into the Sheep Business in 1872. He owned between 2,000 and 4,000 sheep.
- Bought the Mulliner Mill property in 1884
- The Mulliner Mill consisted of a flour mill, a small house, the mill pond, and surrounding acreage. The couple, together with their small son, moved from

town to the mill home. A brother-in-law, Henry Ashton, became the miller and supervised the mill.

- He stood 6 foot 2" inches tall and had brown hair and brown eyes. He had very small feet with a high arch. He always had his shoes made by a cobbler to his particular order. They were odd looking because of the high arch.
- Thaddeus was bothered with asthma and the mill dust seemed to make it worse. He still had his herds of sheep and other properties and so he didn't spend much of his time at the mill.
- When they first moved to the mill their son Thaddeus Ashton, who was just beginning to run around, was playing near the mill race and fell in. Luckily his uncle Henry Ashton who was standing in the mill door saw him. He hastily grabbed a pole and ran along the side of the swiftly moving stream of water and was able to entangle the pole in the little boy's clothes and pull him out before he was injured in the machinery of the mill. Needless to say, the millrace was completely covered within the next few days.
- The family was very happy here at the mill. The children had all kinds of animals to play with. There were geese, turkeys, goats, peacocks and guinea hens, as well as cows and horses. There was also the mill pond to wade and fish in. The boys had a cart to which they would hitch a goat to and go for a ride. The goats though, were very friendly and became quite a nuisance climbing up on the barn and haystacks. When they killed any of the geese their mother would save the down and make quilts, mattresses, and pillows.
- Sold the Mulliner Mill property for the Lehi Sugar Plant. He sold this property, including the home.
- They purchased a half block building lot in town. Here they built another new brick home, a big barn, cow shed, carriage house, and other out buildings and moved their family into Lehi. It was located at first south and second west, just across the street east from the First Ward Chapel.
- As there was no water system in Lehi at that time, practically every home had a well to furnish their culinary water. The Powell family had two wells. One was used in the milk house. The cold water ran through a large container where pans of milk, butter and other things were placed and kept cool. The milk house also included a wash room and a storage cellar was built underneath. This really worked good and the family lived quite comfortably here.

- Thaddeus was always looking for ways to make things easier and better for his wife and family. The Powell home was among the first in Lehi to have electricity and a bathroom.
- As Thaddeus became older, his asthma bothered more. He sold his sheep and bought pasture land south of Lehi. He then concentrated on cattle raising. He bought registered cattle putting them in West Canyon during the summer and in the pastures during the winter.
- He invested money in the Utah Power and Light company and bought quite a bit of stock in other companies.
- Lehi City Councilor 1894-95
- Founder and Director of the Lehi Commercial Club 22 June 1905
- Director and Founder of the Lehi Commercial and Saving Bank 1893-1900.
- He was present as the first bag of sugar was produced at the Lehi Sugar Factory on October 15, 1891.
- He was known for his sound judgement and his progressive views.
- He had a safe and a desk in his home and he often loaned money to people as a bank would.
- He always carried white peppermint candies in his pocket which he gave to all the children.
- Those that knew him often commented what a kind and pleasant man he was. He was loved by everyone.
- He died 7 July 1923 at 10:45 A.M. He was 69 years old at that time.
- He was not a very religious man and he did not attend church very often. He never objected to his wife going and willing paid all the contributions that were required of him. He was never baptized until after he died.

Powell, Thaddeus James

- Lehi Businessman running Powers Shoe Store which was in business from 1921 until his retirement in January 1977.
- Powers was affectionately known as the Mayor of Main Street because of his gregarious charm
- He has been active in the American Legion, being a charter member.
- He is also a charter member of the Lehi Lions Club.
- He has served as secretary, and treasurer of the Old Folks Committee for twenty years.
- He served two terms as a member of the Board of Education of Alpine School District. 1942-19521 He has been a member of the Lehi Fire Department for twenty-seven years and has been the fire chief for sixteen years-Lehi City Fire Chief 1934-51.
- He married Ora Frampton of Pleasant Grove, Utah, June 5, 1929, in the Latter-day Saint Temple and they have two children: Reta and Ralph.
- He died the 29 March 1980.

Pratt, Parley P.

- First person to explore and navigate the waters of Utah Lake by Lehi. Dec. 1847

- A sewer plan and survey were made. This started the drive for sewer in Lehi. Working with Dr. Eddington, the city approved the obtaining a sewer system in Lehi. The plant was finally built in 1955.
- The ordinances of Lehi were revised, and other worthwhile community activities were sponsored.
- He organized the city during World War II for preparedness. He made committee to meet the needs of Lehi.
- He served two terms as director of Utah Municipal League.
- During Mayor Pryor's first term, the problem of unemployment and public work was serious, as the city sponsored state work projects.
- Organized the Civil Defense preparations; Air raids and "blackouts" were practiced.
- Lehi correspondent for the Salt Lake Tribune.
- President of the Lehi Lions Club
- Directed the Lehi Community Recreation department for fifteen years.
- Served in the Utah State Legislature 1965-66
- Elected again to the Utah State Legislature in 1971. He died while in office.

- Governor Calvin Rampton spoke at his funeral.
- He married LaRue in June 1929, and brought his bride to Lehi, where they have made their home since, with two children blessing the union, LaDeane and Keith.
