Ingalls, Merrell Whittier

- Born in Maine in 06 May 1853
- He went by M.W. and not by his given names..
- He married Ethel Converse Stone 21 Jul 1880 in San Francisco, California
- Came to Utah in 1891
- Ingalls went all over the country installing power plants, and other mechanical plants for many different companies.
- Member of the initial group that formed the Lehi Commercial Club in 1905. He was elected to the first Board of Directors.
- Chief Engineer at the Lehi Sugar Factory. He was one of the great minds behind the Lehi Sugar Factory.
- He also served as the Master Mechanic after the Sugar Factory was built.
- James H. Gardner and M. W. Ingalls were awarded the bid for the design and building of the Jordan River Pumps.
- Engineer and Designer (with James H. Gardner) of the Jordan River Pumping Station. The Jordan River Pumping station-at one time was the largest pumps in the world.
- In 1895, the Lehi Dramatic Club was formed. W.M. Ingalls was the director. Their first play was Tony the Convict. They were presented in the Lehi Opera House.
- In the spring of 1896, the group directed by Ingalls put on a benefit for missionaries and they had the largest group they ever had. The night started with the Republic Drum Corps and then was followed by the missionary Minstrels all decked out in dark paint. The night ended with Ingalls having set up a phone line that let them talk to Elder S.W. Ross, a Lehi missionary then in Ireland.
- Lehi City Fire Chief 1901-1902
- He died 2 February 1933 In Salt Lake City

- Lehi City Councilmember 1966-69
- Grand Marshall Lehi Roundup Parade
- Editor and Owner of the Lehi Free Press and the American Fork Citizen
- Founding Member of the Lehi Dance Set in 1948. Served as Publicity Chairman.
- Charter Trustee Member of the John Hutchings Museum 1956
- First Chairman of the Board of Trustees of John Hutchings Museum.
- Sold the Lehi Free Press and American Fork Citizen to Newtah in December 1978.
- Been in the newspaper business for forty-four years.
- Died shortly afterward.
- Utah Newspaper Hall of Fame-Lehi Free Press

Innes, Phoebe

- Grand Marshall Lehi Roundup Parade
- Lehi High School Physical Education Teacher
- Murray High School Counselor
- Worked with the Lehi Stake Young Adults for many years.
- Founding Member of the Lehi Dance Set in 1948. Served as Publicity Chairman.

Jacobs, Harriet Austin

- Only women to be called on a mission from Lehi before 1904. Went to England from May 7, 1897 until Sept. 9, 1897.
- Opens her Millinery Store in Lehi 1866.

Jacobs, John

- Family settled in Lehi in 1852

Jacklin, Ray

- Director Lehi Civic Improvement Association 1989-2004

Jackson, Jeanne Coleman

- Born in Heber.
- Graduated from Wasatch High School; was Studentbody Secretary.
- Graduated from Brigham Young University
- Did graduate work at University of Chicago and Brigham Young University.
- Taught at Lehi High School for many years,.
- 1939-1942 Taught at Brigham Young University in the Clothing, Textiles and Food Department.

- Home Supervisor of the Rural Rehabilitation Program in Sanpete, Millard and Juab Counties.
- Vice-President of the Stake Home Economics Association 1931-32
- Member of the Executive Board of the Utah County Women's Legislative Council.
- President of the Lehi Auctus Club 1946-47.
- Married W. Clell Jackson on September 10, 1936.
- Mother of Three Children
- Second Counselor Lehi Second Ward MIA.

Jackson, John Jr.

- He was born in England on May 17, 1819.
- He married Mary Joynson in 1836.
- Arrived in the Salt Lake Valley in 1868. David Evans was there when he came in. When he said he was a carpenter, David Evans asked if he could bring him to Lehi. He was given permission and the family came to Lehi.
- He was a member of the Silver Band.
- He had problems with the Utah Climate and it seemed to affect his health and strength dramatically.
- On January 5, 1870, John Jackson while freighting a load of cedar posts to Salt Lake City, he was thrown from the wagon, caught his head in a wheel and died from a broken neck.
- He was buried in the old Pioneer Cemetery in Lehi.

Jackson, Juliet Peterson

- Born in Lehi in 1881.
- Married Elmer Jackson on January 7, 1901
- Sang in many choirs including the choirs of Isaac Fox, James M. Kirkham; Relief Society and the ward choirs.
- President of the Lehi Fifth Ward Relief Society
- President of the Lehi Fifth Ward Young Ladies Mutual Improvement Association.
- Member of the Finance Committee for the Lehi Fifth Ward Building
- Member of the Old Folks Committee for twenty years including chief cook for 5 years.

Jackson, Mary Joynson

- Born 30 August 1819 in Barrow, Cheshire England

- Married John Jackson in Chester England on the 08 May 1838
- On June 4 1868 John and Mary and seven children emigrated to America, leaving their two older sons who were married in England. They crossed the ocean on the sailing vessel John Bright, landing in NYC on July 13 1868.
- She crossed the plains in Captain John R. Murdock's company and arrived in Salt Lake on August 30, 1868.
- Came to Lehi soon after arriving in the valley as a request from David Evans for craftsman.
- Her husband was accidently thrown from a wagon and died early in his life, leaving her a widow.
- May married John Shaw. He died in 1881
- She was always know in Lehi as Mother Jackson.
- She was known for her happy cheerful disposition.
- Died in Lehi on the 21 December 1906

Jackson, W. Clell.

- Electrician and Operator for the Lehi Power Plant
- Worked for the Lehi City Electrical Department
- Installed the Lights at Vets Ball Park and the Rodeo Grounds
- During World War II was an electrician at Camp Williams.
- Counselor to Bishop E. N. Webb and Bishop Cecil L. Ash of the Second Ward.
- President of the Lehi Second Ward Young Mens
- Active in Lehi Stake choirs and musical groups.
- Member of the Lehi Lions Club
- Installed the Frogs on the Pioneer Monument.
- Electrical Contractor

Jackson, William Elmer

- Born in American Fork in 1879.
- 1903-moved to Lehi
- Worked at the sugar Factory
- Peddled produce to Bingham Canyon.
- During World War I bought mules and horses for the United States Government.
- During World War II, he worked at Camp Williams, Camp Kearns, and Fort

Douglas.

- He was the first Lehi Rodeo Chairman and on the committee many years.
- Member of the Lehi Old Folks Committee
- Loved Dancing.
- Died the 26 February 1961.

Jacobs, Andrew

- Manager of the Mount Pickle Factory on State Street.

James, Samuel

- Built a home on the west side of the Old Lehi Fort in 1854.

Jameson, Alex

- Opened a Bakery at 82 West Main in 1944
- Moved to a new building in 1946 at 35 West Main
- Hired Alma Peterson to build the new building.
- The Bakery was a 20 X 60 foot block building with a brick front.
- The Bakery had an oven room and a show room with glass shelves.
- The Grand Opening of the building was on 22 July 1946
- Jameson and his family moved to Monticello in 1950..

Jenkins, Keith

- Lehi City Councilmember 1988-91

Jenkins, Lars

- Lehi High School math teacher and Counselor for many years.
- Lehi City Judge
- Grand Marshal Lehi Roundup 2000

Jenkins, Zina

- Lifelong worker at State Bank of Lehi
- Grand Marshal Lehi Roundup 2000

Jenkinson, W.H.

- Initial Lehi FERA labor leader during the depression. 1934.

John, Thomas

- Lehi City Attorney 1896(of Provo)

Johnson, Anna Anderson

- Married to John Johnson
- Expert in working with hair. Made necklaces, watch chains, art work and the like from hair.

Johnson, Charles L.

- Owner Johnson Store in Lehi Junction on Railroad Street
- On October 19, 1905, Charles L. Johnson purchased the junction store from William Melanthay.
- Johnson moved his family into a three room house attached to the south side of the mercantile.
- Much of the business was filling orders to send to the mining towns of Sunshine, Toplift and Mercur.
- The most popular item was fresh baked bread shipped by railroad from the Royal Bread Company.
- In 1916-17, Johnson built the new brick store near the old frame one.
- Three years later he constructed a new frame residence just north of the store.
- For a while, Jenna Johnson became the storekeeper, while Charles worked in a gravel pit at the point of the Mountain.
- In 1926, they leased the Johnson General Store to Will and Lizzie Evans while the Johnsons moved to Pleasant Grove.
- In 1931, the Johnsons moved to Lehi and opened the Busy Corner Store at 101 West Main Street. The business was not successful.
- In 1934, the Johnsons moved back and took over again the store from Jessie Peterson.

- Lehi City Treasurer 1946-47

Johnson, J.E.

- Lehi City Councilmember 1934-39

Johnson, John

- Came to Lehi in 1862
- Lived “Over the Creek”
- Farmer

- Lehi North Stake Presidency 1983
- Lehi Businessman
- Lehi City Mayor 2006-2009

Johnson, Mark I.

- Lehi City Council member 2003-present.

Johnson, Ralph

- Opened a Western Auto at 173 West Main in January 1947-50
- Moved the Western Auto to 181 West Main in 1950-51

Jones, David

- In 1887 was a charter member of the Lehi Silver Band.

Jones, Elias M.

- Construction Foreman for the Salt Lake Temple
- Supervisor of the Masonry on the Lehi Tabernacle
- The appropriate ceremonies placed in position the cornerstone of the Lehi Tabernacle by Bishop Thomas R. Cutler. September 12, 1901. He assisted Bishop Cutler.

Jones, Ellen William

- Born in Wales on 1 December 1839
- Married to Thomas R. Jones
- Came to Lehi in 1861
- Lived first year in a cellar
- Built first home outside the Fort Wall
- Later moved to North Branch.
- First President of the Lehi North Branch Relief Society in 1877. Served for 35 years.
- First Counselor in the Primary. Served for 25 years.
- Adopted William Hadfield
- Died 9 January 1935

Jones, Frank W.

- Member Lehi Stake Presidency 1947-1968

Jones, Florence

- Hired as operator in 1905 for the Rocky Mountain Bell Telephone company.
- She was responsible for the handling of local calls.

Jones, Florence Ida Taylor

- Florence Ida Taylor Jones, daughter of James and Ann Rogers Taylor, was born in Lehi August 7, 1862.
- When she was but a small child, she took part, along with all of her family, in some of the plays which were produced at the Lehi Playhouse.
- She was married to Thomas Jones in 1883.

- She had eleven children, five boys and six girls, eight of whom survived. They are Marion J. Johnson, Florence J Firmage, Norma J. Nicholes, Verna J. McDonald, Alice Jones, Earl T., Clarence T., and Leland W. Jones.
- She was an extensive reader. In her later years, her grandsons loved to talk to her about the sports world.
- Among her many hobbies were growing flowers, and doing needle work.
- She passed away March 31, 1941.

Jones, Helen

- Member of the Lehi Auctus Club; secretary in 1950.

Jones, Jack

- In 1887 was a charter member of the Lehi Silver Band.

Jones, J.G. Dr.

- Dentist in Lehi in the 1920-30's
- Office was at 82 West Main.

Jones, Mable Rockwell

- School Nurse
- Volunteer at Hutching's Museum
- Great-Granddaughter of Orrin Porter Rockwell

Jones, Samuel

- Member of the First Lehi Choir in 1852

Jones, Thomas R.

- Came to Lehi in 1861
- Lived first year in a cellar
- Built Home outside the fort wall
- Later Moved to the North Branch(new survey)
- On October 1, 1893, he became the first Branch President of the Northwest Branch (later became third ward). Was released in 1896.
- Director the start of the construction of the Third Ward Church. October 1, 1893
- Adopted William Hadfield and brought the Hadfield family to Lehi. Given him to raise by the judge when he was on the jury.

Jones, Thomas W.

- Lehi City Marshal 1918-1920

Judd, Riley

- Built a home on the North side of the Old Lehi Fort in 1854

- Member of the Lehi Dramatic Association in 1854.
- Lehi Militia Group called to Echo Canyon later went to Wyoming to help Lott Smith antics.
- Part of the Lehi Militia called to defend Fort Limhi against the Indians March 8, 1858

Julian, Paul

- Born in Lehi
- Served in World War II as a pharmacist's mate in Rhode Island.
- After World War II, used the GI bill to get a pharmacy degree from Idaho State.
- Operated a pharmacy in Sprague, Washington.
- Returned home to Lehi
- Opened Julians Drug in the former Jameson Bakery Building at 35 West Main in 1950.
- In early February 1954, he purchased the Merrihew building (the Dalley Building) and moved his Drug Store there. This is at 98 West Main Street.
- He made his living residents in the upstairs of the building.
- Saturday 27th March, 1954 was the grand opening of the new Julian's Walgreen Drug.
- The business stayed open until 1964.

Karren, Charles H.

- Lehi City Marshal 1894-95

Karren, Edward

- Lehi City Council Member 1904-05.

Karren, John

- Member of the first settlement of Lehi at Sulphur Springs Winter 1850-51
- Veteran of the Black Hawk War 1865-67
- Member of the Lehi Militia Group that fought in the Tintic War 1856
- Lehi Militia Group called to Echo Canyon later went to Wyoming to help Lott Smith antics.

Karren, Maria Lawrence

- Member of the first settlement of Lehi at Sulphur Springs Winter 1850-51
- Married to John Karren
- Caregiver to her family

Karren, Thomas

- Member of the first settlement of Lehi at Sulphur Springs Winter 1850-51
- Built a home on the south side of the Old Lehi Fort in 1854.
- Lehi Resident who served in the Mormon Battalion 1846-47
- Imported the first Agricultural equipment to Lehi-the threshing Machine.
- First Missionary called from Lehi. Called to the Sandwich Islands. Served from 1852-1853.
- First Councilor to Bishop David Evans.
- Helped bring pioneer groups to Utah.

Karren, Thomas Jr.

- Member of the first settlement of Lehi at Sulphur Springs Winter 1850-51
- Veteran of the Black Hawk War 1865-67
- Part of a Brigham Young called Lehi team to go to Winter Quarters and bring LDS converts to Utah 1861-66
- Lehi City Councilor 1859-60

Keate, Arlene Allred

- First President of the Olympian Club formed in 1944.

Keith, Roy L.

- Born in Missouri in 1893
- Married Mary Evans of Lehi.
- Enlisted February 8, 1915.
- Casualty of World War I
- Died in Louisiana from a fall from a moving train.

Kendall, Eli

- Lehi City Judge 1904-05; 1910-11

Kenning, Dr. James

- Lehi Dentist who had a dental office at 189 West Main from 1948-49.

Kenning, Martha

- First President of the Serimpian Club formed in 1949 and charter member..

Kerns, Henry

- Family settled in Lehi in 1851

Kirkham, Dean

- American Legion Committee to Build Veterans Ballpark 1952
- Lehi City Councilmember 1954-65
- World War II veteran
- Honored in Spring 2013 for role in creating Veterans Ballpark.

Kirkham, George

- George Kirkham, son George William and Mary Astington Kirkham, was born March 11, 1852 in London, England.
- As a young child he was given up to die, but healed by Charles Penrose.
- Became an architect and builder.
- Designed many of the buildings in Lehi.
- He did the finish carpentry in the St. George and Salt Lake Temples.
- He was an entertainer with his cousins, at the Lehi Music Hall and the Garff Opera House.
- As a young boy witnessed the Indian attack by Little Soldier's group on an Overland Stage killing all.
- He was a bass drummer in the Lehi Brass Band and bass fiddler and caller in the Kirkham Brothers Orchestra.
- He was a member of the Mormon Tabernacle Choir and went with them to the Chicago World's Fair Expedition in 1890.
- Made a concert tour of Southern Utah and entertained with his daughters Leah and Maude in 1893.
- He married two sisters Mary and Sara Russon.
- He had 21 children.
- He died March 6, 1923.

Kirkham, George William

- Born March 16, 1822
- Came to Lehi in 1860
- Crossed the Plains in the R. F. Neslen's company
- Spent time in building fences and roads.
- Helped in the building of the early Public Buildings.
- Died April 26, 1896

Kirkham, James

- James Kirkham was born August 28, 1849, in London, England, a son of George William Kirkham and Mary Ann Astington
- With his parents, he came to America arriving in Salt Lake City, September 18, 1859. The family first lived to what is now known as Sugar House. Soon after they moved to Lehi where the Kirkham family made their permanent home.
- He was taught to play the concertina by Edward Beesley and they would

duet with Beesley on the violin on the journey across the plains.

- They would provide music for the pioneers to dance at night while crossing the plains.
- He acted at the old Salt Lake Theatre. He also played in the orchestra there.
- He helped build the first railroad through Echo Canyon.
- He also helped build the great American Transcontinental Railroad.
- When the celebration was held at Promontory Point for the connecting of the east and west divisions of this great railway, James Kirkham sang a song he had composed while working on this railway.
- James Kirkham was a veteran of the Blackhawk Indian Wars.
- He taught school at Fort Herriman, Salt Lake County.
- For several years, he was in the mercantile business with his sons in Lehi.
- He was tithing clerk for the old Lehi Ward under Bishop Thomas R. Cutler for more than seventeen years.
- He went to England, his native country for a missionary for the Latter-Day Saint Church.
- He was called as a Patriarch.
- December 18, 1873, James Kirkham married Martha Mercer, daughter of John and Ann Capstick Mercer. Their children are James Mercer, Mary Ann Anderson, Francis Washington, Oscar Ammon, Myrtle Fitzgerald, Eva who died at age fourteen, Ebenezer John, and Elizabeth Jane who died in her infancy. Martha Mercer died November 20, 1890.
- He also married Emma Wooten, daughter of Thomas and Ruth Smuin Wooten. Their children are Albert Wooten, Richard Astington, Aurther Jesse, Milo Franklin, Rose Winnifred Thomas, Wanda Emma, Ruth Ester Smellie, and Florence Luella, who died and infant. Emma Wooten Kirkham died April 22, 1926.
- His third marriage was to Miriam Adams Eckles.
- He liked to travel and made a trip to Europe, visiting many countries. He crossed the Atlantic five times.
- He was a member and Secretary of the old Brass Band, and Kirkham Brothers quadrille band.
- For a time, he made his home in Raymond, Canada, and was postmaster while living there.
- He was town marshal for Lehi at one time.

- In the later years, he moved to Salt Lake City, and was for several years, gatekeeper for the Salt Lake Temple.
- He was eighty years of age, within a few days, when he died.

Kirkham, James M

- Takes over as editor the Lehi Banner and moves location of the paper 1905.
- In 1887 was a charter member of the Lehi Silver Band.
- Utah Newspaper Hall of Fame-Lehi Banner
- Created the Standard Knitting Company in the Kirkham Building 1906
- James Kirkham and Sons Store goes into business in 1893. It stays in business until 1904.

Kirkham, Joseph

- Joseph Kirkham, son of George William and Mary Astington Kirkham was born December 28, 1856, in London, Surrey, England,
- In 1887 was the Band Leader of the newly organized Lehi Silver Band.
- In 1887 was a charter member of the Lehi Silver Band.
- Leader and Director of the Lehi Silver Band
- He, with his three brothers, James, George and Hyrum were well known and in great demand as musicians and entertainers throughout the State. Joseph manufactured his own instruments, making many guitars and violins, on which he played very proficiently.
- Being skilled as a stonemason, he was called to work on the St. George Temple.
- He met and married Tyresha Cragun March 5, 1875, in the St. George Temple.
- November 15, 1905, he married Mary Jane Stoddart in the Salt Lake Temple.
- He died at Lehi, Utah June 9, 1943.

Kirkham, Joseph H.

- In 1887 was a charter member of the Lehi Silver Band.

Kirkham, Kate W.

- Charter Member of the Athenian Club in 1909.
- One of the first Organists in Lehi. Played for church meetings in the Lehi Meeting House.

Kirkham, LaVerde Bushman

- Sells the property for the Veterans Ballpark for a meager \$1.500.

Kirkham, Lou Gene Peterson

- Married Gen Kirkham
- Mother of four children.

Kirkham, Margaret Jane Cavanaugh

- Margaret Jane Cavanaugh Kirkham, daughter of William and Margaret Quinn Cavanaugh, was born in Inverkeithing, Fifeshire, Scotland, May 1, 1888.
- Her parents were devoted Latter-day Saints and brought their family, from Ireland where they were converted, to Salt Lake City in 1903, making their home in the Twentieth Ward. Later they moved to San Francisco and then to Lehi.
- She served in the Alpine Stake Young Women's Mutual Improvement Association Board and has been active in ward choirs.
- In the Second Ward Relief Society, she acted first as teacher, as counselor in the Presidency and finally as president.
- For nearly twenty-five years, she was a member of the Old Folks Committee, serving some time as chairwoman.
- A member of the Athenian Club.
- She was blessed with a rare singing voice and freely gave her songs at Church, weddings, and funerals. During the terrible "flu" epidemic of 1915, she sang almost daily, sometimes several times a day at graveside services for victims of that dreaded disease.
- At Lehi, she first met Thomas F. Kirkham and they were married in the Salt Lake Temple by John R. Winder, November 2, 1909.
- She is the mother of two daughters Phyllis Margaret and Bonnie Jean.
- She died 29 August 1952.

Kirkham, Mary Astington

- Born July 6, 1824
- Crossed the Plains in the R. F. Neslen's company
- Died October 27, 1881

Kirkham, Melvin

- Lehi City Council member 1972-1975
- Banker for several firms.
- Lehi Fifth Ward Bishopric

Kirkham, Thomas Franklin,

- Thomas Franklin Kirkham, son of George and Sara Russon Kirkham, was born in Lehi, Utah, July 20, 1882.
- He attended George N Child's self-improvement ninth grade-the beginning of Lehi High School.
- He graduated from the Brigham Young University business training with a class of 9, in 1904, and has practiced accounting since.
- He maintains a Fire, Automobile and Bonding Insurance Agency and his hobby was gardening.
- He served in the Elder's Quorum presidency, secretary and later president in the 127th Quorum of Seventy; twenty years as Sunday School chorister; forty years as Sunday School teacher; secretary of Alpine Stake Young Men's Mutual Improvement Association; twenty-seven years as Second Ward Clerk and presently Lehi Stake Auditor.
- He went on a mission to England, May 1906, and answered a call there from President Heber J. Grant for volunteers to go to German. In that country, fifty-three people accepted his Gospel message.
- Lehi City Treasurer 1912-13.
- Lehi City Recorder 1930-33;
- Appointed Financial Manager of the Lehi Sewer System in 1954
- Lehi City Recorder 1952-57
- He was a member of the Lehi Home Dramatic Company.
- He was a member of the Lehi Opera Company,
- Charter member of the Lehi Lions Club being the first "Tail Twister";
- Sons of the Utah Pioneers Centennial Caravan in 1947
- Editor and Chairman of the Lehi Centennial History 1950

Kirkham, Tyresha Cragun

- Tyresha Cragun, daughter of James and Eleanor Lane Cragun was born March 27, 1857, in Mill Creek, Salt Lake County
- She met and married Joseph Kirkham March 5, 1875, in the St. George Temple.
- Eleven children were born to them: Joseph Hyrum, Tyresha (Mrs. Jesse G. Webb), Shelia Virginia (Mrs. Leo Clayton), Nathan and the following who died in infancy: James William, Amelia, Geneva, Priscilla, Mary Ellen, Robert Elisha, and Melvin Millard.
- Died March 3, 1894 at Lehi, Utah.

Kleinman, Carolyn

- Purchased LeFeria reception center from the Greenwood and formed the Colonial House in April 1976.

Kleinman, Kevin

- Purchased LeFeria reception center from the Greenwood and formed the Colonial House in April 1976.

Knight, William A.

- Lehi City Councilor 1920-21
- Outspoken City Councilmember
- Worked at the Jordan River Pumphouses

Knudsen, Merl

- First secretary of the Lehi Auctus club in 1939.

Knudsen, Christian

- Christian was born in Ringsaker, Norway on 24 April 1856
- Christian was 14 when his uncle returned to Norway from Utah as a Mormon missionary. He taught Christian's parents and family, and they were baptized. But not Christian. He had been schooled in the religion of his country and found himself very bitter when all the rest of the family joined the Church.
- Came across the ocean with his family on the ship "Nevada"
- In 1872, they headed by train to Utah. They arrived in Salt Lake City, July 17, 1872,
- My Uncle Mons Andersen told us that we must go to his folks in Lehi.
- But the next day, July 20, 1872, a man by the name of Mathias Petersen from Lehi came for us in a brand-new wagon. Happy were we. We came as far as this side of Sandy and stopped overnight. The next day, this being Sunday morning, July 21, 1872, he arrived in Lehi. He was 15 years old.
- About 11 o'clock we drove up to the home of Mons Andersen, and out came Sister Christine Andersen to bid us welcome and put her arms around us one by one and kiss the rest of them. When my turn came, that was something I was not used to, so I didn't know what to do. For some reason I didn't run away. A host of neighbor children and aged folks came around us and shook hands with us. I guess they bid us welcome, for I could not understand a word of English.
- On Friday morning, July 26, 1872, there came a man to the house of Mon

Andersen who wanted a boy to help him in the fields. His name was Peter Petersen. My wages were \$8.00 a month. I worked with him 20 months.

- August 30, 1873, he was baptized into The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints by Mons Andersen and confirmed by Abraham Losee in Lehi.
- He built his home in 1909. with care so that would last through the millenium. The home was at 22 East and 100 North in Lehi. It is still there today. It was built out of brick.
- This home became a halfway home for the Scandinavians going to and from Salt Lake. They would make it to Lehi and stay at that house. This was accomplished through the Scandinavian Society of Lehi.
- His phone number was 138 J
- He served as Sunday School for many years.
- He was a farmer and raised stock in Lehi.
- His ranch was seven miles west of Lehi.
- He was praised for being the hardest working farmer in Lehi.
- He was a large donor to supply Lehi's assessment for the Provo Tabernacle, the American Fork Tabernacle, and the Lehi Tabernacle.
- Knudsen married Sarah L. Otteson, of Spanish Fork in 1879 and they had 10 children.
- In 1921 he was chosen to a Church Selection Committee for choosing a place for the Lehi Fifth Ward.
- The Committee chose the Heber Comer Home at 100 East and 500 North.
- He served a mission to Norway in 1887.
- He died while driving a team of horses on his ranch. He was thrown from the wagon and broke his neck. He was found the next day.
- He died on the 19th of June, 1926 and was buried in the Lehi Cemetery.

- She has seven grandchildren and seventeen great-grandchildren.
- She passed away in Lehi September 12, 1925 at the age of 70.

- During military service he was set apart as a part-time missionary and later served in the Kalihi Branch Presidency of the Central Pacific Mission. Since, he has served as Stake Sunday School secretary, Superintendent of the

Second Ward Sunday School, and on March 26, 1950, was sustained as Second Counselor in the Second Ward Bishopric.

- He married Edna Smith, daughter of Chester M. and Eva Hutchings Smith, November 7, 1945, in the Salt Lake Temple.

Lundgren, Netta Beata Bentson

- Netta Beata Benson Lundgren was born January 7, 1841 in Asta, Sweden, a daughter of Bent Bentson and Johanna Anderson.
- In 1857, she conversed with some missionaries, and on the 5th day of February, 1857, she was baptized.
- In 1858, she went to Denmark to work in a dairy, first in the country and then in Copenhagen.
- In 1862, the way was opened up for her to come to Zion. She left there on the 15th of April on the ship “Tapscot” and arrived in Utah, September 26.
- She was alone in a strange land and a strange language.
- She met Peter Lundgren, and was married to him on the 4th of October 1862.
- She was blessed with a keen mind, many of her friends and neighbors coming to her for information.
- She died January 13, 1920.

Lundgren, Peter Bent

- Peter Bent Lundgren was born November 18, 1813 in Christanstad, Sweden, a son of Bent Peirson and Elizabeth Monson.
- He joined the army as a young man at which time his name was changed.
- He later joined the Church and was baptized October 9, 1852.
- He was privileged to come to Zion arriving here in 1856.
- He took up several pieces of land, one being around the vicinity of where the mortuary now stands, another in the Third Ward, and still owned by his descendents.
- He made a living by tilling the soil.
- He was married to Netta Beata Bentson on the 4th of October, 1862, at Lehi, by Bishop David Evans.
- The younger folks, along with his children, used to gather at his home for parties, and square dancing.
- They used to gather to peel and dry fruit, after which it was sold and a tenth given for tithing.

- He lived a quiet life working for his wife and six children, who are as follows: Peter Bent, John, Joseph Benjamin, Netta Elizabeth, Hyrum, and Emma Christina (Mrs. Luther Coates),
- He died December 6, 1898 at Lehi and was buried in the Lehi Cemetery.
